First English Lutheran Church.—In consequence of the absence of Rev. Dr. Hay this church will be closed to-morrow morning and evening.

The Commissioners of Lancaster county have laid another appropriation of \$10,000 in aid of the families of volunteers resident of that county.

Rev. W. R. DeWitt is announced to preach in Columbia, Lancaster county, to-morrow morning and evening. He has few superiors as a pulpit orator, and our Christian friends in Columbia may expect a rare theologian treat on the occasion.

The Wheat Prospect.—The present season is said by those whose interest it is to keep "looked up" in such matters, to be an exceedingly favorable one for the growing of the wheat crop. So far as we have heard, the wheat fields throughout the country present a very promising appearance.

Mails for the Blockading Vessels.—On the 10th proximo, the U. S. steamer Rhole Island will sail from Philadelphia for Port Royal, Key West and Ship Island. She will carry letters and newspapers to the blockading vessels, &c., at the above stations. Letter bags will be open at the Foreign Letter Office, Philadelphia Exchange Room, up to the evening of the 9th proximo.

GRAPE VINES.—Their varieties.—The past two years has put forth many new names of vines, but none that have established any just claims to merit that can place them by the side of our best varieties of well ascertained character. If we take the Isabella as a standard of hardiness, we may place above it as more hardy the Delaware, Anna, Concord, To Kalon, Elsburg, Diana and probably Cayuga. These may all be regarded as very hard, and in the order in which they stand. As fully equal in hardiness, at least to the Isabella, may be mentioned Allen's Hybrid, Lincoln, Lenior and Union Village, all of which excel in quality, though by very different degrees of excellence.

LOCOMOTIVES FOR THE CENTRAL RAILROAD.—The Pennsylvania railroad company now have two hundred and twenty nine locomotives, of which one hundred and fifty-one are in first class condition, and forty-three are in running order. Of the whole number, twenty-three new engines were added during the year 1861. The total passenger engine mileage during the year was 1,118,187 miles; of freight, 3,148,064; and distributing engines, 148,205, making the grand total 4,414,056 miles, or 779,594 miles more than was run in 1860. The average cost per mile run for repairs of engines and the cost of new engines added during the year was \$7.81. A saving of 76 cents per 100 miles in fuel has been effected, by adapting more of the engines to the use of coal. In 1858 the cost of fuel per ton of 100 miles was \$8.19, and in 1861 only \$6.41. The company now own 8,192 eight-wheeled cars, and 678 four-wheeled cars.

THE CONFIDENCE MAN, who was recently operating in this city, and who stopped at the Butler House and left without paying their bills, and who no doubt had something to do with the robbing of Mr. Williams at the railroad depot a week since, were arrested in Pittsburg on Wednesday last. They had been engaged in their tricks in that city, but succeeded in eluding the police, until a dispatch and description of the rascals was sent to Pittsburg by Mayor Kepner, when they were at once traced to the Monongahela House and arrested. They gave the names of J. Reynolds and Henry Palmer. When arrested, they had one hundred dollars in money of the same description of funds as those lost by Mr. Williams at the depot in this city. They also had tickets for numerous railroad lines, so that they could jump on the cars at any time, and go either east or west. They had no baggage at the hotel, but had kept it at the depot ever since their arrival here. They are both genteelly dressed, and pretend to belong to Louisville. The persons are detained in Pittsburg for trial.

THE NEW BRIDGE built over the Schuylkill by the Pennsylvania railroad company, has been opened for traffic, and cars now pass over it daily. The iron superstructure of this bridge consists of three spans of one hundred and ninety-two feet or one hundred and eighty feet clear between supports. The middle span, which is supported by a cylindrical iron frame upon the centre pier, is turned by two men with ease, the time occupied being about two minutes. East of the bridge there is another iron bridge of seventy-two feet span, which passes over Sutherland avenue, and the abutments of the two bridges are connected by a series of stone arches, four in number, each of thirty feet span. A temporary trestle work, which has been recently completed, connects the west end of the Schuylkill bridge with the Westchester and Philadelphia railroad, in front of the Almshouse. From the latter point a track is laid to the Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore railroad, at Washington street, a distance of four thousand two hundred and fifty-two feet. From Washington street to the main line of the Pennsylvania railroad, the distance is nine thousand three hundred and twenty-nine feet. They are now laying north of Market street four sidings, having an aggregate length of four thousand and seven feet, and so located that they can readily be connected with the proposed junction railroad, which will probably occupy the ground upon which the Delaware extension line was located, between the Almshouse and the main line of the Pennsylvania railroad.

OUR NEIGHBORS ACROSS THE WAY.—The First of April brings a stir, not only in business and financial affairs, but also produces changes in domestic and neighborhood relations. For three months many houses throughout the city have been labelled, "For Rent." These labels have now been removed, and there is a commotion in and about the house and curiosity seekers across the way are all agog. The old neighbors are preparing to "move out," and the new neighbors about to "move in," are making their appearance. Where are those going to, and who are these just arrived? are the all absorbing questions. Moreover it is important that these questions be correctly settled; and the movers, therefore, must not be annoyed at the numerous questions, looks, observations and nods of the people across the way. If the out-goers were good neighbors it is pleasant to learn, they are not going far; if they are bad neighbors it is gratifying to know they are entirely beyond reach. To know the precise character, or rather the received reputation of the incomers is of still more importance, good neighbors are not only an honor, but they are a comfortable blessing daily experienced.—An effort, therefore, to learn the "position" of a new neighbor cannot properly be termed inquisitiveness; but is rather a legitimate search after desirable information. Furthermore, the windows in the house "just opposite" were made to look out of, and it is entirely proper that they should be thus used.

AND should it so happen, that handsome young ladies reside "just across," it is of course their especial privilege to see out of, and still more to be seen at the windows; for "A thing of beauty is a joy forever," a beautiful lady at the window, with a scenery of drapery and flowers, will be an abiding joy to a whole neighborhood. It is also a pleasant reflection for strangers to know that they are carefully noticed in their movements, and that as often as they appear in front of their personal beauty is to be seen in the ambition of all men.

THE RIVER.—The river is in good rafting stage, and the lumber and timber from above has been arriving all the week. The rush, however, is not upon us yet.
