All letters not reaching their destination, instead of being burned by the cart load. are now carefully sent to the writers, and double postage collected. The following notice on the euvelope enclosing the dead letter to the postmaster explains the further object of the new

The enclosed letter is sent to the writer, under an act of Congress, approved January 21, 1361. If not delivered, and double postage col-General' within one month, with the reasons. for non-delivery endorsed on it, according to section 199 of Post Office Regulations. "If retained a longer period, the postmaster

will be held accountable for the postage, whether delivered or not. The date of receipt at the post-office must be marked on the letter.
"The postmaster will not allow the envelope to be opened before receiving the postage.
