PENNSYLVANIA HOSPITAL.
(From Official Hospital Reports.)

MAY 19, 1860.—Ellen S., aged 23, single, puerperal, was very strong. Two years ago had an attack of acute rheumatism, from which she was confined to her bed or two hours, and subsequently from a relapse for three months. Her joints were swollen, and she was unable to walk, while engaged in house cleaning; she took cold, had pain in her back, felt hot, but had no decided chill. Two days later her ankles began so swell, which was followed by swelling of the knee joints and of the hands. She has now dull pain in her shoulders, and has been unable to sleep, as the red and swollen parts are affected; but the right arm is most so. This is, then, a case of acute rheumatism, or, as it is now fashionably called, rheumatic fever. It is a well remarked typical case.
