committee discharged. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF INVESTIGATION INTO CORBUPT INFLUENCES ALLEGED TO HAVE BEE USED TO PROCURE THE PASSAGE OF THE COMMUTA-TION TONNAGE TAX BILL.

Mr. HOPKINS, (Washington,) from the commines appointed to investigate into corrupt and fraudulent influences alleged to have been brought to bear upon the passage of the act approved March 7, 1861, entitled "An Act for the commutation of tonnage duties," presented a voluminous report.

Before the close of the report the committee say that the conviction is forced upon their minds that unlawful means were used to procure the passage of the said act.

After the report was read, Mr. WILLIAMS offered the following reso-Resolved, That ten thousand copies of the report of the committee appointed to in section the the alleged frauds connected with the passage of the act of 1861 to repeal the tonnage tax, payable by the Pennsylvania railroad company, together with the testimony taken and returned with the said report, be printed for the use of the House; and that the said committee be authorized to continue its sittings until the first day of July next, with directions to file their report in the office of the Secretary of the Com monwealth, to be laid before the Legislature at its next session.

AN ARTILLERY ENGAGEMENT

Yorktown in Flames

OPERATIONS UP TO NOON ON SUNDAY.

WASHINGTON, April 8. From the seat of war in Lower Virginia. private information up to Suuday noon, nas been received. Gen. McClellau's army then confron ed the enemy's line of defence, which extended across the peninsula from Yorktown to James river, embracing three batteries and

several mil dams. An artillery engagement had occurred with Magruder's battery at Winn's Mill, near James river and another with the battery at Lee's Mill, wo miles from Yorktown. The battery in the coutre had not been attacked. The penin-

sula at this point is six mil s wide.

The first shell from Magroder's battery killed three men in the Seventh Maine Regiment, but two hundred shells afterwards

thrown did no injury wnatever.
Yorktown was seen to be in flames, and it vas conjectured that the rebals had fired the town, perhaps with an intention of evacuating their position. The place, it was supposed, would be taken and occupied by Gen. M. Clellan on Sunday night. So lar there has been no infantry engagements.

All dividends in scrip or oney or sums of money thereafter declared be due or payable to stockholders of any tailroad company, as a part of the earnings, or fits or gain of said companies, shall be subj-ct to, and pay a duly of three per centum, on amount of all such interest, or coupons or dividends wherever the said shall be paid.

All remaining amendments having been acted Mr. BLAIR. (Mo.,) obtained the consent of the H use to offer a new section: that any person Appointment of Brigadier Generals claiming to own services or labor for life, under the laws of any State, shall pay a tax on such person of two dollars.
