Baltimore, May 17, says that dispatches received this afternoon and evening, not official but considered trustworthy at the Headquarters, announced that Princeton, the capital of Mercer county, Va., where Gen. Cox's advance was stationed, was attacked and captured by the rebel force under Humphrey Marshall.
