THE PROCLAMATION OF GEN. HUNTER REPUDIATED.

General Totton on the Forts and Sea-Cost Defences.

WASHINGTON, May 19. The President has issued a proclamation re pudiating the alleged proclamation of General Hunter as unauthorized, and of no validity and effect, and reserving to himself alone the right to determine whether he can constitutionally adopt such a policy if the contingencies of the war eventually make it necessary.
