GIVE HIM HIS DUE.—Mr. Cowes, of the Patent office, Washington, states that Thomas Gregg, of Collinsville, Pennsylvania, is undoubtedly the inventor of metallic defensive armor for ships. The angulated system of ship building, as exhibited in the Merrimac, and the frigate recently launched at Philadelphia, is claimed to be invented by Josiah Jones, of the British Navy, as late as 1859. The Thomas Gregg mentioned in the above paragraph was the father of Messrs. John and William Gregg, both Methodist ministers, the former stationed at Bainbridge, and the latter in this city. Mr. John Gregg, a few days since, submitted to our inspection a copy of the original drawing, made by his father in 1814, of the proposed gun-boat, and we were particularly struck with the striking resemblance it bears to the pictures, representing the rebel gun boat Merrimac. We understand it is the intention of Mr. Gregg, to procure from the Patent office, at Washington, certified copies of the caveat of his father's invention, after which a representation of it will appear in one of the illustrated papers.
