BEAUREGARD'S OFFICIAL REPORT. The official report of the battle of Shiloh, giving an exaggerated account of rebel transactions in that contest, has at length made its

appearance, but its great length forbids its pubication in the columns of the TELEGRAPH .--Beauregard was not as dilatory in the preparation and printing of this report, as he was in his comance of the Battle of Bull Run; and if he is not a good fighter, it must be confessed that he is an adroit writer. 


