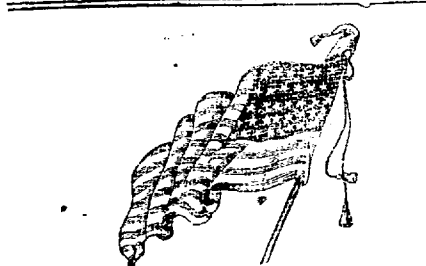

THE REBELS REPULSED WITH GREAT LOSS. TERRIBLE BATTLE ON THE CHICKAHOMINY. Official Despatch from Gen. McClellan.

REBEL GENERAL PETTIGREW AND COLONEL LONG CAPTURED. Splendid Bayonet Charges. The Rebels Repulsed With Great Loss.

CAPTURE OF PRISONERS. WASHINGTON, June 1. The following dispatch was received at the War Department this afternoon from the FIELD OF BATTLE, 12 o'clock, June 1.

WASHINGTON, June 1. To Hon. E. M. Stanton, Secretary of War.—We have had a desperate battle, in which the corps of Sumner, Heintzelman and Keyes have been engaged against greatly superior numbers.

WASHINGTON, June 2. The following dispatch was received at the War Department this morning: HEADQUARTERS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF THE MISSISSIPPI, CAMP NINE CORNHILL, June 1, 1862.

WASHINGTON, June 1. From dispatches from before Richmond to-day we learn that during the whole of the battle of this morning Prof. Lowe's balloon was overlooking the terrific scene from an altitude of about two thousand feet.

WASHINGTON, June 2. The following dispatch was received from General Pope to Major General Halleck: It gives me pleasure to report the brilliant success of the expedition sent out on the 28th inst. under Col. Elliott, in command of the 23rd cavalry.

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IMPORTANT FROM CALIFORNIA AND MEXICO.

Retreat of the French from before Puebla. TRIUMPH OF THE MEXICANS. SAN FRANCISCO, May 26.

The steamer Orizaba, from Panama, has arrived at this port, and also the ships Zingara, Robin Hood and Forrest, from Hong Kong, and the Dublin, from New York.

The ship Dispatch has sailed for Hong Kong. The three shippers from China bring nearly a thousand Mongolian passengers. About the same number of Americans arrived by to-day's steamer from Panama.

Nine hundred passengers sailed for Oregon and British Columbia in two steamers that left last week. MEXICO. The steamer Orizaba brings news from the city of Mexico, via Acapulco, to the 8th inst.

On that day the French army commenced retreating from before Puebla towards Amesa. It appears that there had previously been some fighting.

The following is the despatch announcing the news to President Juarez: PUEBLA, May 8.—Word was received at the city of Mexico, on the 7th P. M., that we have triumphed.

The French have since commenced retreating. We offered their battle this morning, forming our troops in front of their camp; but they refused to accept our challenge, and have turned their backs to their foolish hardboiled and unpardonable credulity.

Please receive the compliments of General Sara Gasa and myself. Yours, forever, YGNACIO MIGI. Gen. Diego Alveraz, who has taken command in the State of Guerrero, as successor to old Juan, has issued a decree, in consequence of the above news, threatening to punish with death all those who shall give information or assistance in any way to the French; also advising the residence of Acapulco to retire ten leagues into the interior, thus abandoning the post to the commander of the first French vessel of war that may come in.

The British squadron, consisting of four men-of-war, was at Acapulco on the 17th inst. FROM PHILADELPHIA! ARRIVAL OF ANOTHER PRIZE. PHILADELPHIA, June 2.

The English iron steamer Cambria was captured off Charleston by the U. S. gunboat Huron, after a chase of five hours, on the 25th ult. She went into Port Royal and sailed from there on the 28th, in charge of Lieut. G. Belknap; Mr. Wm. Budd, first assistant engineer, Jas. M. Adams and Assistant Engineer Boyd were also placed on board. Her cargo consists of liquors, teas, medicines, Enfield rifles, saltpetre, &c. She brings mails and three passengers from Norfolk.

Corn meets an active inquiry and 6,000 bush. yellow sold at \$5 50@5 64. Oats in good demand and 3,000 bush. Pennsylvania sold at 39c., and Delaware at 37c. Coffee, sugar and molasses are held firmly. Provisions very dull. Sales of mess pork at \$12 25. Hams in lots at 6@8c. Sides at 6 1/2@8c., and shoulders at 5@5 1/2c. Lard steady at 8 1/2c. Whisky steady at 24 1/2@25c. and drudge at 22@22 1/2c.
