ATTACK ON CHARLESTON.

Our Forces Landed on Battery and Johns Islands.

NEWSPAPER ACCOUNTS.

CONSTRATION OF THE ENEMY AGAINST CHARLES TON, SOUTH CAROLINA-REPULSE OF THE MNEMY AND CAPTURE OF PRISONERS.

[Dispatch to the Richmond Examiner, June 5.] Augusta, June 4 .- The Savannah Republican of this morning has dispatches from Charleston, dated yesterday, which state that the enemy landed about four hundred strong, at James Island, nearly opposite the city, and were repulsed with the loss of twenty prisoners.

General Gist's dispatch says that the prisoners taken this morning report that the enemy landed 1,700 strong last night on Battery Island, with a like force at Legareville, John Island. The enemy are in front of me, but under cover of their gunboats.

Five, P. M.—The twenty Yankee prisoners captured on James Island have just passed on their way to jail. Ninety more were cut off, and will probably be captured. Heavy firing continues in that direction.

ATTACK ON FORT PEMBERTON.

From the Charleston Courier June 2.] About two o'clock Friday afternoon one of the enemy's gunboats came into Stono river and took a position from which they opened fire on Fort Pemberton, garrissoned under the command of Major J. J. Lucas. The post is under the command of Lieutenant Colonel C. K. Huger. A brisk engagement of half an hour took place, after which the enemy retired. The behavior of the garrison was admirable.

GENERAL RIPLEY NOT IN COMMAND AT

CHARLESTON. From the Charleston Mercury, May 31.] In pursuance of orders, General Ripley, on In pursuance of orders, General Ripley, on Thursday morning, left the scene of his labors ever since the secession of South Carolina, to join the grand army of Virginia at Richmond. He was accompanied by Captain Leo D. Walker, Chief of Staff, and Captain Frank Ravenel, Ald, with Captains Rowlins Lowndes, Wm. Kirkland and Julian Mitchell, Volunteer aids.

FEDERAL OPERATIONS IN S. CAROLINA. Telegram to the Flinchburg Republican, June 2.1 CHARLESTON, May 31.—The Courier of this morbing says the enemy, in strong force, con-sisting of infantry, cavalry and artillery, land-ed at Page Soint on Thursday morning and ad-vanced towards Pocotaligo, within two miles of the Charleston and Savannah Railroad. Our forces at that point, although inferior in num-bers, held the enemy in check until reinforcements arrived, when the enemy retreated to their boats, the Confederates pursuing them. It was thought the engagement would be re-

sumed last night or this morning. Two Confederates are reported to have been Col. Walker's horse was shot under him at

Secession ville. At Pemberton the enemy's gunboats threw a few shell, but they did no injury. They also shelled Newtown. The engagement lasted three hours, doing

no injury to our side.

One Federal gunboat was disabled. The

Mercury says the mast was shot away. It was thought the fight would be resumed this morning.

THE FIGHT AT POCOTALIGO.

[From the Savannah News.] The enemy landed from their gunboats yesterday morning one thousand to fifteen hun-dred strong, and suddenly advanced towards the line of the Savannah and Charleston Rail-road. They had advanced as far as Old Poctaligo, about a mile and a half from the road, when they were met by the Rutledge Mounted Riflemen, numbering ninety men, when a sharp skirmish ensued. The riflemen being the only troops, held the Yankees at bay for some time, fighting them at short range across the old road. Just before reinforcements arrived, they made a precipitate retreat in the direction of their gunboats, pursued by Colonel Walker with a body of cavalry, who came upon the ground just as the enemy retired.

The Rutledge Mounted Riflemen, who, our informant says, had all the first of the fight on our side to themselves, lost one man killed and three wounded, with one or two taken prisoners by the Yankees, who are reported to have had three men killed. Col. Walker, of the cavalry, had his horse shot under him.

The appearance of the enemy at this point was sudden and unexpected, and their retreat so precipitate that our troops did not have a chance to punish their temerity. This movement was no doubt a feint to draw our force from Charleston; for, if they seriously intended to get possession of the road, their effort was a very feeble one. The conduct of the Rutledge Rifle Corps is spoken of in high terms

From the Charleston Mercury.
