Mempuis, June 14. A citizen of this city, who has taken the oath of allegiance, has just returned from Grenada, Mississippi, and reports that a rebel army sixty thousand strong has concentrated there; that business was brisk and provisions plenty.

The following is a copy of the oath adminis-tered to rebel officers and soldiers who volun-

tarily deliver themselves up:
"I solemnly swear that I will bear true silegance to the United States, and sustain the Constitution and the laws thereof; that I will cantain the national sovereignty, peramount to that of all State county or corporate pow-ers; that I will discourage, discountenance and forever opposessecession, rebellion and the disin-tegration of the Federal Union; that I disclaim and denounce all faith and fellowship with the so called Confederate States, and Confederate armies, and pledge my property and my life to the sacred performance of this my solemn cath of allegiance to the Government of the United States of America."

There is much alarm among the whites of Crittenden county, Ark., opposite this city, in consequence of the discovery of a design on the part of several hundred negroes of that county, to simultaneously run away and present themselves to the federal commander for protection.

There are about 4,000 negroes in the county

and only a few hundred whites, some of whom are coming here, not deeming it safe to remain among negroes.

SENATE.

WASHIGTON, June 16.

Mr. Howe, (Wis,) from the committee of onference on the bill making appropriations or certain boundaries, made a report.

The Vice President called the attention of the Senate to the fact that the committee of conference had altered the text of the bill. Strict parliamentary rule required that the committee

of conference can only determine on the disagreeing votes of the two Houses. If such rule was allowed, it might lead to very bad results on important bills, such as appropriation bills. Mr. Foors, (Vt.,) said that no parliamentary law was better settled than that the jurisdiction of the committee of conference was limited en-

tirely to the disagreeing votes, and they could not put in new matter in a bill.

Mr. Powerl, (Ky.,) moved to commit the bill to the committee of conference.

Mr. Hown, (Miss.,) thought there was no definite law on this subject, and thought there were numerous precedents for such a course.

Mr. TRUMBULL thought this a serious matter, and he would never consent to establish such a precedent as allowing the committee of conference to legislate on new matters in this way. Such a practice would be destructive to all good legislation, and make the Senate simply

a body with the veto power over legislation done by the committee of conference. At one o'clock the naval appropriation bill was taken up.
