NEWS FROM COMMODORE DUPONT'S FLEET.

Death of Lieut. John C. Sproston.

CAPTURE OF A NOTORIOUS REBEL.

WATER FROM MEXICO

Arrival of a Bearer of Dispatches.

DEFEAT OF THE FRENCH AT PUEBLA CONFIRMED.

The Fight Bravely Contested on both Sides.

THE FRENCH FORCES HEMMED IN AT ORIZABA.

WASHINGTON, June 17. Commander Dupont has forwarded to the Navy Department a report from Lieutenant Commanding Ammen, of the U. S. gunboat Seneca, at Mayport Mills, St. Johns river, Florida, announcing the death of Lieutenant John G. Sproston, the executive officer of that vessel. On June 8th he left in command of three boats with acting master J. H. Rodgers, master mate, Fields, and forty men with small arms, he was accompanied by thirty men from the patrol. The object was to capture a man named George Huston, a Captain of a company of rebels now in the vicinity of Black Creek.

I was informed that Huston boasted of having hung a negro pilot who was captured at the time of the death of Lieut. Com. Budd, near Smyrna, and on that account I wished him as a prisoner for the purpose of receiving the general tranquility of persons along the river, most of whom I doubt not would gladly acknowledge the Government of the United States were they not in fear of violence from men of this character.

Lieut. Sproston landed at early daylight and proceeded rapidly with his party to the house of Huston. The latter, it appears was apprised of his coming, and met him at the door, armed with a double-barrelled gun, two pistols, and a bowie knife. Upon demand of Lieut. Sproston to surrender himself a prisoner, Huston, who was with him, the latter, was entering high upon the roof and killing him instantly. Huston discharged the other pistol and gun without further injury to our party, and was instantly wounded in four places, and brought on board. He is supposed to be mortally wounded. Several shots were fired from Huston's house by persons who escaped. Huston's firing upon Lieut. Sproston, supposed to be as he was by a large force was willful murder and involved the necessity of his own destruction.

Commander Dupont, writing of Lieutenant Sproston, says he was an able, brave and devoted officer from the State of Maryland. He had come under my observation on the China station in 1858. He was distinguished while in command of one of the boats which destroyed the rebel privateers under the guns of the Pensacola Navy Yard in September, 1861, and his whole conduct during the war has been gallant and meritorious. I consider him a great loss to the fleet and the service.

E. L. Plumb, Esq., bearer of despatches from Mexico arrived here on Saturday. Plumb left the city of Mexico on the 21st ult., and Vera Cruz on the 1st inst., and brings ratified copies of the postal convention and extradition treaty concluded with Mexico in December last, the ratifications of which were exchanged in the city of Mexico on the 20th ult.

The news of the defeat of the French at Puebla is fully confirmed. The Mexicans were not, as has been stated, in greater numbers than the French; on the contrary, they were in less numbers, and a portion of them only had the advantage of entrenchments. The fight was bravely contested on both sides, but in each of the three determined charges, the French were valiantly repulsed and forced to retire.

Since their retreat to Orizaba, the French forces have been closely hemmed in at that place, but no attack upon them will probably be made until the disposition of the Emperor is known. It is still held that he will withdraw his support from the reckless schemes of Soligny and Almonte.

The policy of the Constitutional Government thus far has been purely defensive, and no feeling of animosity has as yet been roused against either the French people or Emperor; but the hatred against Soligny and Almonte, and their partisans, is intense.

A few setting assistant surgeons are wanted by the Navy Department for temporary service.

XXXVIIIth Congress—First Session.

WASHINGTON, June 17. SENATE.

The Pacific railroad bill was taken up. The question being on the amendment offered by Mr. HARLAN, to make the road at point, or as near Fort Kearny as shall be found practicable by actual surveys, which was discussed at length by HARLAN, POMEROY, LANE, (Kansas,) McDONALD, MORRELL WILSON (Mass.) and HEMMONS, and was rejected, yeas 18, nays 51.

The question then received the commencement of the committee, firing the one amendment of the committee was modified on motion of Mr. CHASE, so as to make it the one hundredth degree, within the territory of Nebraska, and was adopted.

A large number of amendments were proposed by the committee and adopted. On motion of different Senators a number names were added to the list of incorporators, and the bill was reported to the Senate. Adjourning.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Further proceedings were interrupted by the expiration of the morning hour, when the House went into committee of the whole on the state of the Union. Mr. FRENCH, (Mo.,) in the chair, and proceeded to the consideration of the special order, namely, the bill to authorize an additional issue of the United States Treasury notes.

Mr. STANTON, (N. Y.,) said, the mode adopted six months ago for raising money has

worked well as a war measure. Neither the executive or the legislative department could place a limit to the expenditure of the government during the war. All they could do was to contract a debt which is necessary to sustain our army and navy, as all parties are agreed that there must be a vigorous prosecution of hostilities; therefore all parties should afford the means for that purpose. The Secretary of the Treasury ought to be clothed with ample power to meet any contingency, and he would vote to confer it upon him, believing that he could exercise it wisely, and for the best interest of the country. The ground upon which this bill rests is necessary, and hence immediate action is essential.

The Treasury bill was then laid aside. The House concurred in the Senate's substitute for Mr. Reynold's bill. It forever prohibits slavery in the territories now existing or which may at any time hereafter be found or acquired.

The Senate bill donating lands to the several States and territories for the establishment of colleges for agriculture and mechanic arts was taken up.

The House by large majority refused to refer it to the committee on Public Lands. It apportions lands to each State and Territory at the rate of thirty thousand acres for each Senator, representative and delegate according to the census of 1861. The interest on the proceeds of the sales to be appropriated for the above named purposes. The bill was passed, yeas 99, nays 25. Adjourning.
