WINCHESTER, Va., June 19.

Mr. Cowan said he had also received letters from Priladelphia and Pittsburg, favoring the bridge, but they were mostly from railroad men He caused a letter to be read from the president of the board of trade, saying that he was opposed to the bill on examining it.
