CHLORIDE OF LIME AS AN INSECTICIDE. - Ding chloride of lime on a plank in a stable, all kinds of flies, but more especially biting flies, were quickly got rid of. Sprinkling beds of vegetables with even a weak solution of this salt, effectually preserves them from caterpil lers, butterflies, mordello, slugs, etc. It has the same effect when sprinkled on the follage of fruit trees. A paste of one part of powdered chloride of lime, and one half part of some fatty matter, placed in a narrow band round quested to meet at the armory of the First City the trunk of the tree, prevents insects from creeping up it. It has even been noticed that rats and mice quit places in which certain quantity of chloride of lime has been spread. This salt, dried and finely powered, can no doubt he employed for the same purpose as flour of sulphur, and be spread by the same means."
