After fighting half an hour another ball hit me in the head, and took off a small piece of the bone. The blood flowed faster than ever, but l was then borne from the field exhausted by loss of blood, and by fatigue. I am now at No. 3, Harrisburg Hospital, am doing well, and am anxious for another chance at the rebels. I have been highly commended by my general and su-
