IMPORTANT RECOMMENDATION.

The following letter from Brig. Gen. F. J Poster, commanding Fifth Provisional Army Corps, will be read with honest gratification by every man who has the success and the reputation of the brave men who are now entering the ranks of the army at heart. This letter, as will be seen, is addressed to Gov. Curtin, and from its respectful tenor and dignified counsel, we have, no doubt that its suggestions will be heard by His Excellency, as they are in fact nothing more than a response to a policy which the Governor himself is determined to adopt in organizing and officering the new regiments.

The letter itself, so important in every particular, comes at a most opportune and favorable period in our military organizations. It needs no further comments from us, than its recommendation to the general perusal of the public, as a surety that the welfare and organization of the private soldier are among the highest considerations and solicitude of those who are to lead him into battle :
