"All persons who have a regular and honorsble discharge from the army or navy of the U ited States in pursuance of any law of the State," are exempt from draft.

The clause in question is only intended to apply to the State service, and it is not at all applicable to the three month's men who were called into service by the President under the provisions of the act of Congress of February 28th, 1795.
