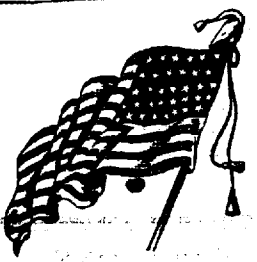

We have learned that slavery, instead of being an element of weakness, is an element of strength to the rebels. We have learned that it is one of their chief props and staffs of support; that the four million blacks held in bondage are used as effective weapons with which to fight and oppress us.

We have learned that the contest between us and the Confederates is reduced to a question of pure brute force. We have learned that the arm that can strike hardest, and the foot that can stand firmest, and the brain that can plot surest, will win the day.
