From Gen. Pope's Army. ANOTHER ATTACK BY THE REBELS.

Gen. Pope Falls Back to Centreville. HE IS STRONGLY ENTRENCHED.

Reinforcements Reported Arriving. WASHINGTON, Aug. 31. The rebels were heavily reinforced yesterday, and attacked Pope's army before the arrival of Generals Franklin and Sumner.

LATEST. Private dispatches direct from Washington of to-day, state that Gen. Franklin and Sumner had arrived with heavy reinforcements of Gen. Pope, and that everything was progressing favorably to-day.

THE VERY LATEST. NO FIGHTING ON SUNDAY.

THE ARMY WELL CONCENTRATED. WASHINGTON, Aug. 31. Information received here indicates that there has been but little if any fighting to-day.

The Excitement in the City. Commanders of the Different Divisions.

Arrival of Wounded from the Late Battles. An Appeal to the Loyal Women and Children of the United States.

Appointments made under the Revenue Law. WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.

Gen. Pope's statement that Heintzelman's corps would move on the enemy at daylight is confirmed by the heavy firing heard from that vicinity.

Gen. Schenck arrived to-day, having been severely wounded in right wrist in battle of yesterday.

Intense anxiety in hotels and streets to get news of the fighting, but the reports are so indefinite as to up to noon to-day not justify their repetition.

FROM ALEXANDRIA. Firing Heard in the Direction of Centreville. TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION ESTABLISHED WITH MANASSAS.

Large Numbers of Troops Awaiting Transportation. GEN. BURNSIDES IN POSSESSION OF FREDERICKSBURG. ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 30. There has been heavy firing heard to-day in the direction of Centreville, and the contest of yesterday was undoubtedly renewed this morning. Telegraphic communication has been established to Manassas, and the cars are running as far as Bull Run. The bridge and railroad are being repaired with the greatest dispatch and trains will probably extend their trips to-morrow. There are still a large number of troops in Alexandria awaiting transportation to the field of battle.
