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

In response to the proclemation of Gov. Curtin; calling on the loyal men of the Common wealth to organize and arm for any emergency which might arise from the crisis in which we are involved, the citizens of Harrisburg met in. their respective wards, yesterday afternoon, and took the initial steps in the movement proposed.

This first movement was not followed by any actual organization. It appeared only to have Leave New York at 71 P. M., by the Fast the calling of the people together, for the pur pose of testing their temper, leaving permanent organization for a future early day.

It is expected that the arms will be furnished to each company to-day, and that an immediate organization will be had by the election of officers. After this has been secured, the discipline and effectiveness of each company will be perfected as speedily as possible.

The companies of all the wards, marched to the capitol grounds, where they assembled around the steps of the rear of the capitol, and were addressed by Governor Curtin, Parson Brownlow, and other distinguished speak-

Gov. Currin addressed the assembled mass emarking that he had had more than one occasion to test the loyalty and patriotism of the people of Harrisburg, and had always found them true and unalterable in their devotion to the Government. But the conduct of the people of the State Capital, to-day, excelled all that has heretofore distinguished them. They had responded to his appeal in a manner at once enthusiastic and generous—they now proved indeed, that they were in earnest in their purpose to aid in prosecuting this war to a successful and permanent conclusion. Gov. Curtin further remarked that the plan of thus assembling the people to organize and drill as military companies, was demanded by the highest considerations of public safety and na becomes by the features and permanent tional success.
