The Rebels Invade Maryland

FREDERICK CITY OCCUPIED.

The Potomac Crossed at Three Points.

THE TELEGRAPH WIRES CUT.

Union Citizens Leaving Frederick for Pennsylvania.

Arrival of Union Refugees at Hagerstown.

Enemy Estimated at Five Thousand

THEY ISSUE A PROCLAMATION.

A Provost Guard Appointed.

They Purchase Cattle and Horses with U. S. Treasury Notes.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 7.

Frederick, Md., was undoubtedly occupied yesterday morning, between 10 and 11 o'clock, by the rebels.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—It appears from private accounts that the rebels crossed the Potomac river on Friday night and early yesterday morning, and thence marched for White Oak Springs within three miles of Frederick.

One of their first acts was to send a force to cut the telegraph wires and seize the bridge over the Monocacy.

The regiment guarding this point evacuated their position on Friday. Great numbers of persons were leaving Frederick all day yesterday and proceeding towards Pennsylvania.

Accounts from Hagerstown say that many Union refugees from Virginia had arrived there.

THE VERY LATEST.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 7.—Fugitives who left Frederick last night report the city occupied by about five thousand rebels, under Gen. Hill, consisting of cavalry, infantry and artillery.

The rebels issued a proclamation promising protection to private property. A provost guard has been appointed. Purchases were being made in U. S. treasury notes of cattle and horses, which were being sent back toward the river.

[Frederick city, stated in the above dispatch to be occupied by a force of the rebels, is the capital of Frederick county, Maryland. It is situated two miles north-west from the Monocacy river, forty miles north-west from Washington, and sixty miles west from Baltimore.

A branch railroad, three miles long, connects it with the Baltimore and Ohio road. It is considered as the second city of the State in wealth and commercial importance, and is the third in population.

The city contains a handsome court house, about fourteen churches, three or four banks, several seminaries, and five or six newspaper offices. It has also manufactories of iron, wool, paper, ropes and earthenware. Population about 10,000.]

FROM FORTRESS MONROE.

CAPTURE OF REBEL REGIMENTS FROM NORTH CAROLINA.

The "New Merrimac" Reported Down James River.

FORTRESS MONROE, Sept. 6.

There is a report here this evening that the "New Merrimac" has come down the James river from Richmond, and is now in sight of our flotilla near Newport News.

A party of Dodge's Mounted Rifles captured one hundred and fifty rebel recruits from North Carolina, on their way to Fort-Burg, yesterday.

Major Stetson, in command of a scouting party of the Eleventh Pennsylvania Cavalry, had a brush with the guerrillas recently, and captured fifteen prisoners without incurring any loss.

Out of the seven hundred rebel prisoners brought here from the Potomac last Wednesday, over one hundred of them have taken the oath of allegiance and have been discharged.

The steamer Ericson, John Brooks and Vanderbilt left here this morning for Newport News, to take on board the balance of army baggage wagons and ambulances for the army of the Potomac. Major General Keyes arrived here this morning.

The Richmond Whig of the 1st Inst. contains a lengthy and spicy editorial, censoring Jeff. Davis and his Cabinet for the indiscreet appointments of clerks in all the departments of state—calling them Jews and Yankees, and accusing them of being spies.

GEN. POPE BELIEVED FROM HIS COMMAND.

He is Assigned to the Command of the Department of the Northwest, Minnesota.

Major General Pope has at his own request been relieved from the command of the army of Virginia, and has been assigned to the command of the Department of the Northwest.
