Terrible Explosion at Pittsburg. OVER EIGHTY LIVES LOST

Pirrusune, Sept. 17.

A frightful explosion occurred at the United States Arsenal this afternoon at two o'clock in a large frame building known as the laboratory.

About 176 boys and girls were employed in the building at the time of the disaster, 75 or 80 of whom were killed.

The explosion was followed by another until the entire building was destroyed.
