A PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS, I have been authentically informed that a certain MARY ELIZABETH GERMAN, a child about five years of age, daughter of Emanuel S. German and wife, of the city of Harrisburg, in this Commonwealth, was enticed away from her home and atrociously murdered in the suburbs of said city, near the Cemetery, on the afternoon or evening of Friday, the Third day of October, A. D. 1862, and all efforts for the arrest of the guilty party or parties, whose names are unknown, have up to this time proved ineffectual:

ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS! to any person or persons who shall apprehend and secure for trial the murderer or murderers of the said child, MARY ELIZABETH GERMAN, to be paid upon the conviction of the criminal or criminals; and I call upon all officers of justice and good citizens everywhere, to be vigilant and unremitting in their efforts for the apprehension of the said murderer or murderers, so that they may be brought to punishment under the laws.

WHEREAS, By the third section of the act of the General Assembly of this Commonwealth, passed the twenty-second day of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, entitled "An Act to establish a Sinking Fund for the payment of the public debt," it is made the duty of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, the Auditor General and State Treasurer, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, created by the said act of Assembly, on the first Monday of September, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and to certify to the Governor, the amount received under the said act, the amount of interest paid and the amount of the debt of the Commonwealth redeemed and held by them:

And WHEREAS, By the ninety-eighth section of the act of the General Assembly, passed the nineteenth day of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, entitled "An Act to provide for the ordinary expenses of the government," etc., it is provided that after the receipts to the Sinking Fund to the amount that may be necessary to cancel the relief issues now in circulation under the provisions of the act of the fourth of May, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and the relief issues under the act of the tenth of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, shall be applied toward the cancellation of said issues.
