D., one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, entitled "Ad Act to establish a Sinking Fund for the payment of the public debt," it is made the duty of the Secretary of the Commonwealth, the Auditor General and State Treasurer, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, created by the said act of Assembly, on the first Monday of September, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and on the same day annually thereafter, to report and certify to the Governor, the amount received under the said act, the amount of inter est paid and the amount of the debt of the Commonwealth redeemed and held by them Whereupon the Governor shall direct the certificates representing the same to be cancelled, and on such cancellation issue his Proclamation IT should not be forgotten that this stating the fact and the extinguishment, and final discharge of so much of the principal of

said debt. AND WHEREAS, By the ninety-eighth section nineteenth day of April, A.
