COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, ANDREW G. CURTIN, Governor of the said Commonwealth, A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, By the third section of the act of the General Assembly of this Commonwealth, passed the twenty-second day of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, entitled "An Act to establish a Sinking Fund for the payment of the public debt."

AND WHEREAS, By the ninety-eighth section of the act of the General Assembly, passed the nineteenth day of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, entitled "An Act to provide for the ordinary expenses of the government," etc., it is provided that there after the receipts to the Sinking Fund to the amount that may be necessary to cancel the relief issues now in circulation under the provisions of the act of the fourth of May, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and the re-issues under the act of the tenth of April, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, shall be applied toward the cancellation of said issues.

AND WHEREAS, Eli Slifer, Thomas E. Cochran and Henry D. Moore, ex-officio Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in obedience to the requirements of law, report and certify to me, that the debt of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, redeemed and held by them from the first day of September, A.
