On the sheath is represented the battle of South Mountain, in which Col. Cake, with the 96th, participated, and 1861. proved himself a gallant and worthy soldier. It also contains the Pennsylvania coat of arms and is of a rich chased work. The scabbard. also, bears the initials of the Colonel, "H. L.
