HOSPITAL FOR OFFICERS .- The Surgeon General has established a hospital in the vicinity of Philadelphia, in the homestead on what is known as the Carnac's Woods. The price of board at this establishment is to be \$3 50 per week, and only those who are officers of the army are to be admitted This is all very well. We approve of the effort in all cases to contribute to the comfort of the sick and wounded, but where an officer of the army does not consider the hospital accommodations furnished to the private soldier, sufficient for his own dainty and delicate accommodation, he should be left to provide his own, without the assistance or the enterprise of the Surgeon General, even if the price of board is fixed at \$3 50 per week.
