The 15th day of April, 1864, is designated as the time up to which the numbers required in each ward of a city, town, &c., may be raised. Voluntary enlistments and drafts will be made in each ward of a city, town, etc., which shall n it have filled the quota assigned to it within the time desirated for the contract of the contract

the time designated for the number required to fill said quota. to fill said quota.

The draft will be commenced as soon after the 15th of April as practicable. The Government bounties, as now paid, will be continued until April 15, 1864, at which time the additional bounties cease. On and after that date one hundred dollars bounty only will be paid as provided by the act approved July 22, 1861.

The iron-clad Osage, which was in advance, was allowed to pass without interruption. The flag-ship Hinman followed, when a heavy fire was opened upon her, which when a heavy fire was opened upon her, which after some time obliged her to retire in a damaged condition, with the loss of two men killed and eight wounded. The flag was then transferred to the Onchita, whose powerful guns silenced the enemy's battery, which consisted of three thirty-two pounders. But lit-tle difficulty was experienced in driving the enemy from their position at Harrisonburg, further up the river, which our forces burned. The gunboat Onchita received but slight injury during the engagement, but the Hinman will require considerable repairs. The gunboat Conestoga came in collision with the General Price on the Mississippi, on the 10th, a short distance below Natchez.
