Liberty a Chimera.

According to the Tory Organ and the Jour nal of Commerce, the principle of slavery, the right to barter in human baings, is so strongly engrafted in the Constitution, that it can never be removed; and all efforts tending to its removal must be accounted insane, irreverent and inconsiderate. With the African laborer, they made slavery the means of securing his degradation, and with the Anglo American, they have made free trade, a competition with all the pauper labor of Europe, the influence of achieving the same end. In the future when it suits the purposes of these men, they will denounce the pursuit and advocacy of all religion which does not approve and uphold slavery, as another chimera. Every principle of equity approves of such a standard of judicial salaries—and we are heartily glad to see the proposition of Mr. Bigham on the subject, thus almost unanimously approved by the friends of the Commonwealth.
