New York, March 21. Gold fell after the second board to \$1 63 3/4. Croft & Prentiss' shoddy factory, in Pearl street, was destroyed by fire to-day.

The Secretary of the Treasury has given positive orders prohibiting the shipment of American coal to Canada. The jury to-day gave a verdict of \$300 damages against the Express newspaper for libel.

THE CALL FOR 200,000 MEN. Quotas of the Various States. WASHINGTON, March 22.

The following is the statement fixing the quota of the several States for the President's call of 200,000 men of March 14th, 1864, with all credits deducted from or deficiencies added thereto, excepting veteran volunteers, to March 1st, 1864.

Maine's quota under call for 200,000, March 14, 1864, 4,721; number to be credited, none; deficiencies to be charged, 1,920; balance to be furnished, 6,641.

Delaware's quota, 985; credit, none; deficiency, 691. Balance, 1,676. Maryland's quota, 4,317; credit, none; deficiency, 17,411; balance, 21,728.

THE War in Tennessee. CUMBERLAND GAP, March 22. Lieut. Col. Davis of the 11th Tennessee Cavalry, who was wounded and taken prisoner on the 2d of February, has escaped, and reached our lines in safety.

Mr. Clark (N. H.) called up the Senate bill amending the act relating to foreign coins and coinage of coins, which was passed.

Mr. Willsey (West Va.) addressed the Senate at length on the bill to promote enlistments, by the freeing of the wives and children of slaves.
