THE attention of Soldiers who have been honorably discharged from the United States service, on account of disability contracted while in the line of duty, and who wish to enlist in the Invalid Corps, is respectfully called to the following letter from the Provost Marshal General's Office, from which it appears that they may receive the bounty offered by the ward, borough or town, to which they may wish to be credited: (LETTER.)

WAR DEPARTMENT, PROVOST MARCHAL GENERAL'S OFFICE, WASHINGTON, February 23, 1864. The Provost Marshal General directs me to say, that men enlisted for the First Battalion Companies of the Invalid Corps, in accordance with the provisions of the General Orders, Nos. 105 and 212, Adjutant General's Office, 1863, and the instructions of the Provost Marshal General, (see Circulars Nos. 187 and 188, Provost Marshal General's Office,) will be credited to the quota to be furnished under the draft of the ward, borough, town, or city and State from which a quota is to be drawn, in that order, in the order of the Provost Marshal General, in charge of Invalid Corps Bureau.

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EVENING EDITION. Pennsylvania Legislature. REPORTED EXPRESSLY FOR THE TELEGRAPH. SENATE. AFTERNOON SESSION. TUESDAY, March 29, 1864. The afternoon session being devoted exclusively to the consideration of private bills, none others were considered. Mr. FLEMING called the act to incorporate the Oak Hill cemetery upon the act of Millersburg, Dauphin county, and it passed, finally. At 5 P. M. the Senate Adjourned.

ARMY OF THE POTOMAC. Review of the First Corps by Lieutenant General Grant. HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC, March 29. Lieutenant General Grant, accompanied by Major General Meade, reviewed the First Corps, now a portion of the Fifth, this morning, near Culpeper. While passing along the line, they were greeted with the most enthusiastic cheers. Merritt's cavalry division was also reviewed, the whole presenting a fine appearance.

The Second Corps were to have been reviewed in the afternoon, but a heavy rain storm having set in, and which still continues, it was postponed.

From Washington. WASHINGTON, March 29. The Secretary of the Navy has issued an order by which Ensigns R. S. Crew and H. J. Blake, of the frigate Niagara, have their appointments suspended for going below during their watches. Acting Ensigns W. S. Dana, E. F. Harrington, Wm. B. Hoff and C. B. Rathbone, for the same offense, have their appointments revoked, and are ordered to the Naval Academy; and Acting Ensign R. G. Irwin, guilty of over-staying his leave, has been ordered to a third rate ship, and is not to be allowed to go on shore for six months.

The Advance on Fort Smith. FORT SMITH, Ark., March 27. Before General Thayer's army marched from here towards Texas, the following order was issued: "Soldiers of the Army of the Frontier: The word is forward again. Your country asks of you the endurance of new trials, and the exhibition of renewed valor. You go to recover lands desecrated by the hateful banner of treason. Be patient, be valiant, as you have always been. Illustrate in your course the patriotism, the soldier, the hero, in their noblest forms, and victory will reward you; and when you return to your homes and kindred it will be your satisfaction to receive the welcome due from a nation on which you have helped to save. (Signed) JOHN M. THAYER, "Brigadier-General Commanding."

Col. Johnson, 6th Kansas, commands the district here.

From Chattanooga. A large batch of Union deserters, were brought in this morning from the North. Rebel deserters continue to come in from the front. The weather is fine. The Rebels of this morning has information that the rebel General Martin's division of cavalry has arrived at Cartersville, Ga., from East Tennessee, and are recruiting. Wheeler went from Cassville to Dalton. The rebels claim to have 50,000 men at Dalton and vicinity, and say Longstreet will move into Kentucky with 26,000 men.

An order issued by Johnston restricts all orders, even to major generals, to but one horse, owing to the scarcity of forage. All heavy artillery is being removed from Kingston to Altoona.

XXXVIIIth Congress—First Session. SENATE. WASHINGTON, March 29. After the introduction of various important bills, a message was received from the House announcing the death of Hon. Owen Lovejoy, of Illinois, a member of that body. Appropriate eulogies were delivered on the deceased. The usual resolutions passed, after which the Senate adjourned.

MOVEMENTS IN NORTH CAROLINA—FROM TENNESSEE—SUFFERING IN RICHMOND, &c. The Norfolk Old Dominion has received a copy of the Richmond Enquirer, of the 25th inst. The news is unimportant. We give the following extracts: BURNING IN NORTH CAROLINA. We understand official information has been received at the War Department concerning the landing of a large force of the enemy in Washington, N. C. The force is said to be under command of General Burnside.

Whether an immediate forward movement was contemplated or not, the recent heavy fall of snow in that vicinity, together with the heavy condition in which it will leave the roads, and the attendant flooding of the swamps, will put a stop to any advance into the interior for some days to come. The new levies that have been recently equipped at Norfolk. It is not presumed that they have been withdrawn from Meade's army.

From the Lynchburg Republican. We have the report from East Tennessee that the Yankees, who had advanced as far east as Morristown, have again taken the back track and retired to Strawberry Plains, only some fifteen or twenty miles from Knoxville. The retreat of the enemy has disappointed for the present at least, all prospects of a fight.

Corn in demand, and has advanced; sales 3,000 bushels yellow at \$1 22 to \$1 23. Oats common 84 to 86c. Cloverseed sells at \$7 25 to \$7 50. Timothy at \$2 50 to \$3 00, and flaxseed \$3 20. Coffee firm; sales 1,000 bags Rio and Lagayra at 38c. 200 bbls Cuba sugar at 14 to 14 1/2c. No change in provisions: 500 tierces ham, in pickle, sold at 14c; and shoulders at 9 to 10 1/2c. 200 bbls whisky sold at \$1 00. Stocks dull; Pennsylvania lives at 99 1/2; Reading railroad 73; Long Island 48; Pennsylvania railroad 74. Gold 165. Exchange on New York, par.
