No. 20.  
AUTHORITY having been granted by the War Department to the commanding General of the Department of the Susquehanna, the 1st Battalion, Three Years' Volunteer Infantry (formerly 3d Month's) consisting of Six Companies mustered into the United States Service for Three Years, or during the War, is authorized to recruit to Ten Companies of the "maximum strength."

**Pennsylvania Legislature.**  
REPORTED EXPRESSLY FOR THE TELEGRAPH.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**  
THURSDAY, MARCH 30, 1864.  
The Senate re-assembled at 8 o'clock, P. M. Mr. SPEAKER PENNEY in the Chair.

**MR. STARK** called up bill, [H. R. No. 402.] entitled A supplement to an act to incorporate the Washington coal company, and for other purposes, passed April 16th, 1838; passed finally.

**MR. BUCHER** called up bill, [H. R. No. 530.] entitled An act to incorporate the Petersburg and Beedeville turnpike road company, passed finally.

**MR. MONTGOMERY** called up bill, [H. R. No. 498.] entitled An act relating to the New York and Middle Coalfield railroad and coal company.

In committee of the whole, (Mr. NICHOLS in the chair,) said bill was read, amended, so reported, and passed finally.

**MR. REILLY** called up bill, [H. R. No. 405.] entitled An act to authorize the owners of the town plot of New Philadelphia, Schuylkill county, to convey the same to trustees; passed finally.

**MR. RIDGWAY** called up bill, [H. R. No. 534.] entitled An act to incorporate the Union passenger railway company of the city of Philadelphia.

On the final passage of the bill, The yeas and nays were required by Mr. CLEMMER and Mr. WALLACE, and were as follows:

Yeas—Messrs. CONNELL, Donovan, Dunlap, Fleming, Glatz, Graham, Hoge, Householder, Kinsey, Lambertson, Latta, M'Callister, Nichols, Reilly, Ridgway, Smith, Stark, Stein, St. Clair, Turrell, Wilson, Worthington and Penney, Speaker—23.

Nays—Messrs. Clymer, Hopkins and Wallace—3.  
So the bill passed finally. Adjourned.

**LATER NEWS FROM PORT ROYAL, FLORIDA.**

Effects of the Late Storm on the Coast.

Damage to the Continental and Daniel Webster.

Capture of a Rebel Steamer in Florida.

**GEN. SEYMOUR RELIEVED BY GEN. HATCH**

New York, March 31.  
The steamship Fulton, from Port Royal on the afternoon of the 27th inst., has arrived. The steamer edition of the Patriot, has arrived.

The steamer Continental, from Portland, with a portion of the 2d Maine Cavalry Regiment and horses on board, put into Port Royal on the 26th, with the loss of 50 horses, and the remainder badly used up. The Continental was obliged to cut loose from the ship Frank Boul, also laden with men and horses, which vessel she was towing to New Orleans. The Continental is short of coal.

Private M. Stuart, of Co. A, 2d Maine Cavalry, died on board, and was buried at sea on the 24th. The ship Frank Boul, was considered safe and able to care for herself.

The steamer Daniel Webster, with a portion of the Fourteenth New Hampshire regiment from New York to New Orleans, put into Port Royal on the 27th.

The Continental reports passing off Hatteras large quantities of wrecked stuff, new chairs, furniture, &c., supposed from the wreck of some steamer.

The steamer Cosmopolita, arrived at Hilton Head on the 27th from Florida, reports that a naval expedition, up the St. Johns river had captured the rebel steamer Hattie Buck, with 100 bales of cotton, rice, tobacco, &c. It is stated that large amounts of these articles are reported for the 27th inst., to Gen. H. H. Hatch has gone to Jacksonville to relieve Gen. Seymour, who returns to Hilton Head.

The rebels are reported to have withdrawn a portion of their forces from before Jacksonville and Pilsack.

The court martial of Gen. Gordon was progressing.

The steamer Dudley Buck, from Port Royal for New York, has put into Port Royal.

Several British officers are on a visit to General Gilmore's Department.  
J. M. McCrea has been sentenced to jail and fined \$500, for selling liquor to soldiers. After the expiration of the sentence he is expelled from the Department.

XXXVIIIth Congress—First Session.

**SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, March 31.  
The bill to authorize the Postmaster General to contract for the carrying of the Overland Mail from Atchison, Kansas, to Folsom, California, was passed.

**HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.**  
Mr. SHANNON, (Cal.,) from the Committee on Indian Affairs, reported a Senate bill providing for the better organization of Indian affairs in California. He explained that it consolidated two Superintendencies into one, provided for selling the present reservations and locating the Indians on more appropriate reservations, to each of which is to be assigned an agent; the General Superintendent to receive a salary of \$3,000. He advocated the bill on the ground of economy to the Government and benefit to the Indians. The bill passed.

The House then resumed the consideration of the bill declaring the Baritan and Delaware Bay railroad and boats to be post and military routes.

Mr. GARFIELD (Ohio) resumed his remarks in favor of the bill, arguing that at present the means of New Jersey are insufficient for Government transportation purposes, and speaking of the Camden and Amboy railway company as an odious monopoly.

The subject was passed over, and the House resumed the consideration of the National Bank bill. Yesterday the 30th section was amended so as to limit the rate of interests on loans or discounts, etc., to 6 per centum.

Mr. STEVENS (Pa.) to-day offered a substitute for this section restoring the 7 per cent rate as originally in the bill. He would regard the vote on this as a test of the question on the bill itself.

**New Jersey Legislature.**  
TRENTON, March 31.  
Mr. DENSON, of Hudson, this morning, introduced a bill into the Legislature to repeal the charter of the Baritan and Delaware Bay railroad company.

**From Chattanooga.**  
CINCINNATI, March 31.  
A special dispatch from Chattanooga to the Gazette, says that Generals Sherman, Granger, M'Pherson, Sheridan and Barry, arrived at Chattanooga on the 28th, and were in council all day at General Thomas' headquarters.

All was quiet at Ringgold. Gen. Granger and Sheridan went to Knoxville on the 29th.

**The Copperhead Outbreak in Illinois.**  
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 30.  
Col. CALES, Assistant Provost Marshal, started for Charleston, Coles county, last night and telegraphs to-day for the first regiment which left this afternoon. Gen. Heintzelman has also been requested to send troops from Indianapolis. This indicates that the troubles in that quarter are of a serious character.
