REPORTED EXPRESSLY FOR THE TELEGRAPH.

SENATE. THURSDAY, APRIL 28, 1864.

The Senate met at 9 o'clock, A. M. Several petitions and remonstrances of local import, and a number of reports from committees were presented.

BILLS INTRODUCED. Mr. REILLY, an act to incorporate the Locust Dale coal company.

Mr. HOUSEHOLDER, an act to incorporate the Gettysburg Battle-field Monument association.

The following resolution was twice read and adopted. Resolved, That when the Senate adjourns, it will adjourn to meet to-morrow morning at ten o'clock.

On motion of Mr. KINSEY, the Senate proceeded to consider a bill, entitled An act to vacate Hamilton (late Pleasant) street in the city of Philadelphia. Passed finally.

The appropriation bill came before the Senate in order, the question being on the title, which was agreed to.

On the final passage of the bill, the yeas were 22, nays 8. So the bill passed.

Bill, entitled An act enabling the banks of this Commonwealth to become associations for the purpose of banking under the laws of the United States, came before the Senate.

Mr. CHAMBERLAIN offered an amendment relative to the votes of stock-holders. The amendment was agreed to.

The question then being on the final passage of the bill, Mr. HOGE moved to adjourn. The motion was agreed to, and the Senate Adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The House met at 9 A. M. Senate amendments to the revenue bill and the general appropriation bill were referred.

On motion of Mr. QUIGLEY, the orders were suspended to allow the presentation of reports of committees and bills in place. A large number of bills were reported and read in place, which will be noticed when considered by the House.

The House adjourned at 11 A. M., in order that the hall might be occupied by the Union State Convention, in pursuance of the previous resolution to that effect.

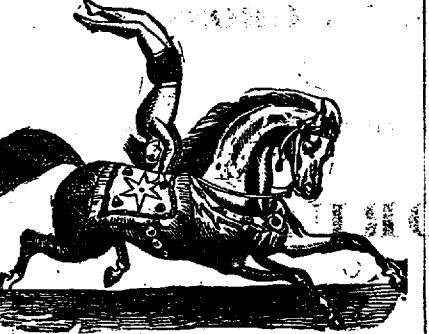
