If They will at once appoint the necessary enrolling officers for their respective districts, with instructions, 1st. To, enroll all persons whose names have been omitted by the proper enrolling officers, previous enrollment, 2nd. All persons who shall arrive at the age of 20 years before the draft.

3d. All aliens who shall have declared their intentions to become citizens.

before the draft.

3d. All aliens who shall have declared their intentions to become citizens.

4th. All persons discharged from the military or naval service of the United States who have not been in such for two years during the present war.

5th. And all persons exempted under the provisions of the second section of the enrolling act, approved March 3d, 1863, but not exempted under the provisions of the at approved February 24, 1864.

III. The Board of Enrollment will also at once proceed to strike from the enrollment, upon satisfactory proof:

1st. The names of all persons who have arrived at the age of forty-five years.

age of forty-five years.

2d. The names of all persons manifestly, physically or mentally unfit for the service.
3d. The names of such persons as are at this time actually and legally in the military or naval service of the United States.

4th. The names of such persons as have served in the military or naval service two years or more, during the present war, and have been honorably discharged therefrom.
