GENERAL AVERILL AT WORK.

DESTRUCTION OF A RAILROAD. Fight Near Wytheville, Va.

UNION VICTORY Jim Jones Whipped.

WASHINGTON, May 20-8 P. M. A later dispatch states that Averill has destroyed the railroad near Christianburg. He had a brilliant victory over the rebel General Jim Jones, at Wytheville.

Brilliant Success of General Averill

GALLEY BRIDGE, WEST VIRGINIA, May 18. Additional information throws some light on the part taken by the cavalry proper under the command of Brigadier General Averill in the expedition to Newbern, Pulaski county, Va. This column went to the right of the main body under the immediate command of General Crook: General Averill reached to within fifteen miles of the Salt works in Tazewell county, on the enemy, driving them on to the body near the Salt Works. This force was under the command of Generals Jim. Jones and John Morgan, and numbered five thousand. Fifty prisoners were captured, among whom was John Morgan's private secretary.

Our loss is but one man.
On the tenth General Averill reached a point within four miles of Wytheville, where he encountered the enemy, four thousand strong under Gen. Jim. Jones. We fought them four hours, driving them and killing and wounding many, and capturing some prisoners. Under cover of darkness the en-emy retreated. Our loss was one hundred and twenty killed and wounded; none missing.

Near Blacksburg, General Averill commenced destroying the railroad, which was most effectually done to a point four miles east of Christianburg. At the latter place a small force of the enemy hastily left, leaving two 3-inch guns, which fell into our hands. General Averill has fully accomplished the work section of him by General Cook. The work assigned him by General Crook. The entire expedition has been a brilliant success in all its parts, giving additional lustre to the high reputation of General Crook. I am expecting full details of the part taken by the main body, hourly.

The Bogus Proclamation.

STATEMENT OF THE ASSOCIATED PRESS

NEW YORK, May 20. It may be interesting to the public and the press who were so terribly imposed upon in the publication of the recent bogus Proclama-tion, to know that in the city of Washington there has of late existed a body of news gathers who have taken the name of the Representatives of the Western Press, composed of Messrs White, Hill and Willard, who have for some time been sending daily dispatches to papers at Springfield and Boston in Massachusetts, and to Rochester in N. Y., as well as to others in Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis and other points at the West. These persons are in no way connected with the Associated Press, which has a well known and reliable agent in that city, as the truth-

ful nature of his dispatches for many years will attest.

It appears, as we learn from the well informed correspondent of the "Commercial Advertiser," that on Monday night a dispatch was sent by members of this Western Press Association, or purported to have been sent by them, announcing that there would be a proclamation calling for a new draft, about

the first of July, that the places of the 100-day men might be filled. Whether the bogus proclamation was concocted by one of the association or whether another person based it upon whether another person based it upon their news, is not yet officially known. It is fair to infer, however, that either some member of the above association was the author of this bogus proclamation, or that some person connected with them, knowing the fact that a call was about to be made, wrote the proclamation upon predictions furnished by their dispatches. One of the members of this Western Press Associated the members of this Western Press Associa-tion is a confidential employee of the War Department and the others occupy official po sitions; thus giving them opportunity to secure all movements prior to their preparation for

the public.

The provost marshal of Washington is giv ing the affair a most thorough investigation, and all the above mentioned persons will be critically examined in reference to this great outrage upon the public and upon the press.

Affairs on the Lower Mississippi. NATCHES, via CAIRO, May 18.

Rathers, the Carlo, in the Mississippi, near Port Hudson, have caused some detention of steamboats. It is known that Polk has detached 10,000 of the 45,000 men in Mobile tached 10,000 of the 15,000 men in Mobile lately, to operate on the river. The steamer Cuba, which started to go up Red river and was turned back at Black river, arrived here this morning, and reports a battery of nine guns at Snaggy Point. No boats have come by for several days. The Union gunboats below and the land force above were expected to capture it, and re-open the river. Red river is reported rising a little.
