Mr. Kinney, delegate from Utah, offered a resolution which was unanimously adopted, declaring as the sense of this House that the present crisis in this causeless and unjustifia-ble rebellion, calls loudly on Congress for united patriotic legislation; that the self sectficing services of our soldiers. unsurpasse ancient or modern warfare, should be sustain ed in the field, and are entitled to our thanks, and forgetting all past differences, it is the duty of Congress to sustain the constitutional authorities of the country in their endeavois to suppress the rebellion. Mr. Grinnell (Iowa) offered a resolution re

questing the President to inform the House whether, by order of the Government, the publication of the World and Journal of Comnerce of New York was suspended, and if so such order and proceedings be communicated Objection being made, the resolution was laid over.

On motion of Mr. Arnold, (III.,) a resolution was adopted instructing the committee on legislation, if necessary, to punish the for-gery and publication of official documents, and also what legislation is necessary to pinish those who through the press or otherwise, give information and aid and comfort to the

Mr. Hubbard, (Iowa,) offered a resolution providing that the House meet daily at 11 instead of 12 o'clock.

Mr. Washburne objected. On motion of Mr. Pendleton, the resolution

was tabled; yeas 91, nays 20. Mr. Pruyn (N.
