THE members of the Ninth Pennsylvania Cavalry, who have been at home on furlough, are again about to depart for the army. Many of them have already arrived here. The Ninth has nobly served its country, having participated in numerous battles. It will give a good account of itself when next it encounters the rebels.

BAPTIST CHURCH. -- The celebrated Rev. Dr. Litch, of Boston, will preach in the Baptist Church, corner of Second and Pine streets, to-morrow afternoon, at 31 o'clock.

There will be preaching at the same place at 102 A. M. and 72 P. M., by Rev. W. H. Richards, of Lynn, Massachusetts.

GERMAN REFORMED CHURCH.-Rev. B. C. Wolff, D. D., of Lancaster, will preach in the German Reformed Church, on Chestnut

street, to-morrow morning and evening. The ordination and installation of elders and deacons will take place at the same time.

BRIG.-GEN. CHARLEY T. CAMPBELL has received the appointment of Inspector-General of the Army of the Northwest. His headquarters are at Sioux City. General C. was formerly Colonel of the Fifty-seventh Pennsylvania Regiment, and his home is in Chambersburg.

PAPER IN DEMAND. - Old newspapers and other printed matter, formerly worth one cent a pound, are now purchased by the paper makers at eight cents a pound. By a process devised since the great advance of papel for such purposes as kindling fires, for cheaper substances may be substituted.

STRUCK BY LIGHTNING. —During the thunder storm on Tuesday night, Mr. Geo. Yeagey, residing near Petersburg, Adams county, was struck by lighting, and almost instantly killed. We understand that he had been reading, and laid down near the stove for a while to rest. The lightning, it seems, struck into the chimney, and was communicated to where he lay by the stove pipe. Two of his children were lying by his side, but were uninjured. All the other members of the household escaped.

MARKET. - Half-past four o'clock, this morning, found a large number of our citizens at market, ready to purchase as soon as the tap of the bell was heard. There was an abundant supply of marketing, and prices were reasonable, except in a few instances. Butter was a drug, and sold as low as twenty cents per pound. 'A great variety of vegetables were offered. Ripe cherries—the first of the season—were sold at twenty cents per quart. Strawberries sold at from thirty to forty cents a box. The prices of fresh fish had declined; fine porgies could be had at six cents a pound, and shad at 25 to 50 cents a-piece.

HIVERS' PIC-NIC.—The Hope Fire Company is making extensive preparations for a grand pic-nic, to be given in Hoffman's Woods, on the 16th of June. It is hoped that the "Hivers," who are always prompt to answer the alarm of fire, may be extensively patronized, and that a very large number of our citizens will attend the pic-nic. The best of order will be observed. No improper characters will be admitted to the ground. When the Hope boys undertake to please the public, and have a day's enjoyment, they are certain to succeed, c nsequently a pleasant time may be expected at the pic-nic.

GEN. KNIPE.—The Lancaster Examiner, in speaking of this officer, says:-Brigadier General Knipe, who has so signally distinguished himself in the war for the suppression of the rebellion, is a native of this county. He was born in the neighborhood of Manheim, and resided in this city for several years. Gen. Knipe is an old soldier, having served throughout the Mexican war, going out as a private, and returning a commissioned officer. At the breaking out of the present war, he at once entered the Union army, and has served most faithfully since. He has been wounded in several engagements, and we hope he may. speedily recover from his wounds. No man in the service has better carned the "stars" than Brigadier General Joseph F. He has been extremely anxious to be relieved from detached duty in order to face the destroyers of his country, and we hope that he may pass unharmed through battle fields, or wherever his lot may be cast. Capt. A. B. Sharpe, of Carlisle, takes his place, and we have no doubt that he will be equally capable to discharge the responsible duties assigned to him.

A REBEL SPY SHOT AND CAPTURED. -The Chambersburg Repository gives the following account of the shooting and capture of a rebel

On Friday last, Mr. Latshaw, the enrolling officer for Franklin township, Adams county, met a suspicious looking character on the road, and questioned him as to his residence. He answered that he resided in that township, but when interrogated as to the names of his neighbors, he found that Mr. Lat-shaw was likely detect to him and he said he had made a mistake—that he resided beyond Mercersburg. From his confused and unsatisfactory statement, Mr. Latshaw felt it his duty to arrest him, and he did so. The prisoner made no resistance, but proposed to walk back to New Salem; but on the way he took the first favorable oppor-tunity to jump the fence and run away. The officer pursued, and was joined by the people of the neighborhood; and after a chase of about three hours, he was recaptured without being injured. Officer Latshaw then bound his feet together, and started for Chambersburg to de-liver the prisoner to Captain Eyster, the Pro-vost Marshal. Latshaw and the prisoner were in a single seated buggy, and Mr. Slona-ker rode behind on horseback. When in the South Mountain the prisoner managed quietly to get his feet loose, and when opposite a dense thicket of laurel, he sprang from the buggy into the bushes, Mr. Slo-naker fired at him and lodged a ball in his ushoulder, making a slight wound, but it did not arrest the prisbuggy and rushed into the thicket after him, and called to him twice to halt or he would fire; but the prisoner continued to get away as fast as possible. Latshaw fired and struck him in the hip, shattering the bone badly
