There are a few things, however, which have not gon e up in the same proportion gold has, and they are the bonnets, cloaks and mantillas so ld by Mrs. M. Mayer, No. 13 Market St., not vithstanding it took gold to import them, or the material out of which they were fabricated. While nearly everything else has advanced from eighty to one hundred per cent over the price of 1861, it is a singular fact that the articles enumerated have not advanced over twenty per cent. As, the large summer stock now on hand at Mrs. Mayer's store was p'urchased when gold was but fortynine cents, premium, she can now sell her goods at least fifty per cent, less than she will be able to p urchase them from the importer a month hence, unless the entire South should be conquered and peace restored. A hint to the wise is sufficient.

sent, up, at the same moment, their united petitions for a blessing upon the country and its rulers.

The exentsion to New York, of which I spoke in my last, was "postponed on account of the weather," it having mined heavily all day Thursday. I presume the postponment is an indefinite one, much to the disappoint ment of many of the delegates. I was sorry to learn that the liberal gentleman who gave the invitation had incurred considerable expense in making his airangements for the contemplated visit.

There was quite an exciting debate in the Assembly on Friday afternoon, upon the pa-per relating to the slavery question, referred to in my last. For a time the scene was a very stormy one. The discussion arose upon certain amendments offered to the original paper with the design of rendering it less objection able and thus secure for it a unanimous vote. The amendments were finally carried, and the paper then agreed to by a vote nearly, if not entirely, inanimous. It takes very decided eround in favor of the extirpation of slavery, and goes far beyond the celebrated deliverance of 1818, a part of which is recited in the preamble. It was reported from the committee by Judge Matthews, of Ohio, who has been a prominent Democrat, and was an office holder under the administration of Mr. Buchanan.

The Assembly has been engaged since Friday evening in hearing the case of Rev. Dr. M Pheeters, of St. Louis. It is an appeal from the decision of his Presbytery dissolving the pastoral relation between him and his church..... He has addressed the Assembly at great length, solemnly denying every imputa-tion of disloyalty, and complaining of the injustice with which he has been treated. No less than five sessions have been occupied in this case, in hearing the speeches of com-plainant and respondent. After that the calling of the roll was proceeded with, and every nember of Assembly who wishes it, is allowed t_{6} express his opinion before the final vote is tal ven..... This is an interminable business, and whe n it will be ended no one can say. There is a g ood deal of unfinished business yet on hand, most of which will probably have to be postpoi ved, as the session has already been extended beyond the usual length.
