### BALTIMORE, June 5.

A gentleman who left the front at 9 o'clock on Friday morning, represents the attack reported by General Grant, as having opened with the fiercest cannonading along the whole line. The commanding could be heard as he progressed down the peninsula.

### THEY HAVE NEVER IN ANY PREVIOUS CAMPAIGN BEEN SO WELL SUPPLIED, AND THERE WAS ABUNDANT PROVISIONS CONSTANTLY GOING FORWARD.

The whole army worships General Grant, and say that he is the only man who has given them a chance to fight.

The belief was universal, both among the troops and the residents of the country in the vicinity of Richmond, that the capital must fall.

There had been no attempt made on the White House, as reported, and consequently the rumored capture of Fitz Hugh Lee and his cavalry was unfounded.

The White House presents a scene of activity unprecedented even during the McClellan campaign.

Several of the rebel wounded that came up on the steamer Connecticut yesterday morning, say that they have no doubt we will be able to take Richmond, but that we will have to walk over many dead bodies.

Several of the rebels on the same steamer also say that General Lee has been taken sick and gone back to Richmond, leaving the army under command of General Ewell.

A dispatch, Cairo, June 3d, says: It is reported that Forrest intends making a raid on Sherman's rear.

General Canby, at Natchez, is organizing his forces for offensive operations.

Among the wounded brought up on the Connecticut were Colonel Ent, 6th Pennsylvania Reserves, and Colonel St. Clair Mifflinland, 11thth Pennsylvania cavalry, shot in the groin.

## LATEST FROM THE FRONT

### Operations Down to Saturday Morning.

### A CAVALRY BATTLE.

### ENEMY REPULSED.

### A BATTLE FRIDAY NIGHT.

### THE ENEMY DRIVEN INTO HIS WORKS.

### The Enemy Withdraws His Left from Burnside's Front of Our Right.

### SEVEN THOUSAND REBELS KILLED AND WOUNDED IN THREE DAYS.

### WASHINGTON, June 5.

The Republican in an extra, says we have authority for making the following announcement:

The Government has official dispatches from Gen. Grant's Headquarters, to eight o'clock yesterday (Saturday) morning.

The two armies occupied their relative positions near Mechanicsville, on the north side of the Chickahominy river, on Friday night.

About six o'clock the enemy made a precipitate attack upon Gen. Wilson's cavalry force, and a sharp cavalry battle was fought, lasting half an hour, which resulted in driving the enemy a considerable distance back into his entrenchments.

The loss on each side is about equal, the exact number is not stated.

We lost several officers; among them was a Vermont colonel.

About eight o'clock on Friday night the enemy made a general attack upon our lines, coming out of his works and exposing his massed columns to a terrible artillery fire.

The attack was most gallantly met and handsomely repulsed, the enemy being obliged to retreat behind his entrenchments again.

At eight o'clock yesterday (Saturday) morning the enemy withdrew his left from the front of our right, then commanded by Burnside.

Since then he has been forced back to the outer works covering the defenses of Richmond.

Properly, he has made many sudden attacks upon our positions, in the hope of surprising

### Grant and turning our flanks. In each instance he came out of his works, exposing his men to our artillery and musketry fire.

During three days' fighting, including Friday, the enemy has lost about 7,000 killed and wounded.

Our loss in the same engagement is something less than that number.

Our men are in the best of spirits and health.

All attempts of Lee to cut General Grant off from the White House have totally failed, so that now the base is complete, and the withdrawing of Lee's left to a point nearer Richmond is evidence that Lee acknowledges his failure.

The present field of operations is about five miles from Richmond, if the two armies remain where they were on Saturday morning.

### WASHINGTON, June 5.

A lot of women refugees came in from the front this evening. Five rebel deserters were sent here this evening by the Provost Marshal of the Potomac.

### Apportionment Bill.

The following is the Apportionment bill, as passed by both branches of the Legislature and signed by the Governor:

AN ACT TO fix the number of Senators and Representatives, and to form the State into districts, in pursuance of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania: That the number of Senators and Representatives shall be fixed by the authority of the same, that until the next septennial enumeration of the people, the number of Senators shall be thirty-three members, and be apportioned as follows, to wit:

I. The first, second, third, fourth, seventh, eighth and twenty-sixth wards of the city of Philadelphia shall compose the First district, and elect one Senator.

II. The ninth, tenth, thirteenth, fourteenth and fifteenth wards of the city of Philadelphia shall compose the Second district, and elect one Senator.

III. The sixth, sixth, eleventh, twelfth, sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth wards of the city of Philadelphia shall compose the Third district, and elect one Senator.

IV. The nineteenth, twentieth, twenty-first, twenty-second, twenty-third, twenty-fourth and twenty-fifth wards of the city of Philadelphia shall compose the Fourth district, and elect one Senator.

V. The counties of Chester, Delaware and Montgomery shall compose the Fifth district, and elect two Senators.

VI. The county of Berks shall compose the Sixth district, and elect one Senator.

VII. The counties of Carbon, Monroe, Pike and Wayne shall compose the Tenth district, and elect one Senator.

VIII. The counties of Bradford, Schuylkill and Wyoming shall compose the Eleventh district, and elect one Senator.

IX. The counties of Luzerne and Columbia shall compose the Twelfth district, and elect one Senator.

X. The counties of Berks, Lancaster and York shall compose the Thirteenth district, and elect one Senator.

XI. The counties of Adams and Dauphin shall compose the Fourteenth district, and elect one Senator.

XII. The counties of York and Cumberland shall compose the Fifteenth district, and elect one Senator.

XIII. The counties of York and Cumberland shall compose the Sixteenth district, and elect one Senator.

XIV. The counties of York and Cumberland shall compose the Seventeenth district, and elect one Senator.

XV. The counties of York and Cumberland shall compose the Eighteenth district, and elect one Senator.

XII. The eighteenth ward, the first division of the nineteenth ward, the third and sixth divisions of the nineteenth ward and the fourth division of the twenty-fifth ward shall compose the Twelfth district, and elect one member.

XIII. The seventh division of the sixteenth ward, and the second and seventh divisions of the nineteenth ward, shall compose the Thirteenth district, and elect one member.

XIV. The seventh and eighth divisions of the fourth ward, the fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, and tenth divisions of the twentieth ward, and the eighth division of the fifteenth ward shall compose the Fourteenth district, and elect one member.

XV. The first, third, fourth, fifth, ninth and tenth divisions of the nineteenth ward, the third and eleventh divisions of the twentieth ward, the first division of the twenty-first ward, and the fifth and sixth divisions of the twenty-fifth ward shall compose the Fifteenth district, and elect one member.

XVI. The twenty-second ward and the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh divisions of the twenty-first ward shall compose the Sixteenth district, and elect one member.

XVII. The twenty-third ward, the first, second and third divisions of the twenty-fifth ward, and the eighth division of the nineteenth ward shall compose the Seventeenth district, and elect one member.

XVIII. The twenty-fourth ward and the second and eighth divisions of the twenty-first ward shall compose the Eighteenth district, and elect one member.
