SAD ACCIDENT.—Many of our readers in thi city, will recognize and regret to learn the death of the bright boy recorded in the following paragraph from the Erie Gazette of the 9th

We sympathize with Capt. E. C. Wilson and lady in the loss they have sustained in the sudden death of a bright and interesting little boy, aged about 7 years. In company with another little boy—a son of Capt. Lanman—he wandered up to the canal, near Reed's wood and coal yard, and while engaged in playing with his companion, fell in and was decreased. His bedy was interred in the companion. drowned. His body was interred in the cemetery on Monday forencon. This sad event should admonish little boys of the peril to which they expose themselves in attempting to cross canal locks, (as they frequently do,) and in going where they may fall into deep water.

THE GRHAT CHICAGO TUNNEL is progressing n a highly satisfactory manner. The workmen have penetrated nearly fifty-feet under the lake through a stiff blue clay mixed with boulders of limestone, some of which are of large size. These stones, although offering but little impediment to the work of removing the clay, deteriorate it somewhat for the purpose of brickmaking. The machinery for the manufacture of bricks is now upon the ground and preparations are rapidly being made to turn out the manufactured article as fast as they will be wanted by the masons. In sinking the shaft, a jet of highly inflaminable gas was met with, and when lighted shot up in a brilliant flame several feet in height. This was succeeded by a flow of water which has was succeeded by a flow of water which has continued ever since, requiring about four hours pumping each day. This has not, however, proved a great disadvantage, as the well at the bottom of the shaft receives it all and drains the whole site of operations. The workmen are furnished with lamps which are fastened to their caps to light them at their work. As fast as the clay is loosened it is placed upon a small car which runs on a rail-way track. It is conveyed to the bottom of way track. It is conveyed to the bottom of the shaft and then hoisted. This subterranean transportation is effected by the use of mules which are accommodated with quarters at the end of the tunnel west of the shatt. The work will now rapidly be proceeded with at the rate of between fifteen and twenty feet per day. The orib-work of the first lake shaft is in process of construction on the north pier and will be completed some time during the month of July.

Bursting of the Great Wiard Gun. The monster gun, whose casting at the Wiard Ordnance Works we described some weeks since, was on Saturday last subjected to so severe a test as to cause its almost total destruction. Though of but fifteen inches calibre, the gun, from its peculiar pattern, was probably the bulkiest piece of ordnance made in this country, being thirteen feet in length, over six feet in exterior diameter, and weighing over 46,000 pounds. The charge was far greater than any ever before attempted consisting of eighty pounds of quick-burning powder, and an elevated shot of nine hundred pounds weight; cartridge was fifteen inches in diameter by fifteen and a half in length, the ball a solid double shot fifteen inches by twenty-four. This is more than three times the service charge. The gun was fired about dusk, and caused an explosion by which many in the city, at the distance of two miles, were much alarmed; when the clouds of smoke and gravel had subsided, it was found that the gun had been blown to fragments, one piece of about 15,000 pounds' weight being hurled a distance of about two hundred feet. In view of the immense charge, Mr. Wiard took every precaution to keep the bystanders at a safe distance, and to his caution we may attribute the fact that no one was at all injured, though the flying fragments passed in alarming prox-imity to many of the spectators. Whether imity to many of the spectators. Whether the rupture was caused by defective casting, or was due merely to the heavy charge, we are unable to state.—Trenton Monitor.
