FROM GRANT'S ARMY.

GEN. WILSON'S EXPLOITS.

TWENTY MILES OF RAILROAD DESTROYED.

THE REBELS FOILED.

They Attempt to Protect the Danville Railroad, But do not Succeed.

ITS TRACK TORN UP AND BURNED.

Capture of Locomotive and Train of Cars, with Refugees From Petersburg.

FIGHT BETWEEN WILSON AND THE REBELS.

WILSON REINFORCED BY THE SIXTH CORPS.

NEAR PETERSBURG, June 28, 11 P. M.

A large body of rebel cavalry that moved around on our left, is now at Beam's Station, on the Petersburg and Weldon railroad.

Gen. Wilson's 3d division of cavalry passed this place a few days ago, en route for the Danville and Richmond railroad.

They were too slow, and Wilson reached the road destroying many miles of track before he retraced his steps, meeting no opposition until he reached the point from which he started. All the track was composed of strap iron placed upon wooden supports.

The one destroyed the other, as the track was torn up and placed upon the wooden sleepers, and burned until it was bent and useless.

A locomotive and train of cars were surprised at one station and before the engine could move off all were in the hands of our men. The cars were crowded with refugees from Petersburg, all the cars with the locomotives were destroyed. Having accomplished his work in a most successful manner Gen. Wilson returned. Over twenty miles of this valuable road was rendered completely useless in a less number of hours.

When his advance guard neared Keam's station, the enemy was discovered in force. They had been patiently awaiting his return at this place, and all the cavalry they could muster was spread out between our gallant soldiers and their infantry supports. They fought all night and during the morning of this day.

Wilson could not push through them and consequently found he must fight till reinforced.

An officer succeeded in reaching General Moore's headquarters with intelligence of their awkward position, and the Sixth corps being on the extreme left, and nearest the scene of strife, was instantly dispatched there to divert the enemy's attention.

A division of the 2d corps soon followed, supported by Col. Collins' provisional brigade. It was thought that the rebels in our immediate front would have opened on us savagely, but all were disappointed—their troops in the direction of our left and rear on Burnside's line.

The rebels begin to use their mortars nightly, throwing shells with more accuracy than is their usual habit.

Gen. Grant, Meade and Butler met at Gen. Burnside's headquarters to-day. The meeting was unofficial, being of a purely accidental nature.

FROM ADMIRAL PORTER.

Rebel Attack Near White River Station.

The Rebels Repulsed.

No Casualties on Our Side.

WASHINGTON, July 1.

Rear Admiral Porter has forwarded to the Navy Department the following communication from Acting Ensign Booby, commanding U. S. ship Lexington:

Off WHITE RIVER STATION, June 22.

Sir, I have the honor to report that an attack was made on this place at 4 o'clock a. m., by the 10th Mississippi rebel regiment, under command of Col. Louthier.

The garrison had just completed the stockade on which they were engaged when you left, and in it they fought bravely, though their pickets had been surprised, and the rebels were close upon them before they were discovered.

The Lexington had steamed up and moved limed ately out into the stream, and opened on them a rapid fire. The enemy was quickly repulsed, and retired to the woods.

We have no casualties, and of the garrison one was killed and four wounded; one negro was killed and two families of refugees carried off. Two dead and three wounded rebels fell into our hands, but most of their killed and wounded were dragged off the field.

The wounded Federals and rebels are being cared for in this ship.

Had there been another armed vessel here I could have cut off their retreat and captured the whole command, but I did not deem it prudent to leave this point with the Lexington.

REPEAL OF THE GOLD BILL.

PHILADELPHIA, July 1.

The Washington Gold Bill was repealed in both Houses to-day.

New York, July 1.—Gold closed at 225—a fall of 57 from the highest point it reached to-day.

From Arkansas.

Fort Smith, Ark., June 28.

The supply of commissaries at this post is adequate. The troops are in good spirits and in fine condition for either offensive or defensive movements.

Colonels Sakaloki and Vallum and Captain Wheeler, of General Steele's staff, have returned to Little Rock. They have thoroughly inspected the troops' works, hospitals, &c., in this District. They return with a report highly creditable to the management of Gen. Thayer, and pronounce Fort Smith the best fortified position west of the Mississippi.

FROM MEXICO.

GENERAL DOBLADO COMING TO THE UNITED STATES.

The New Orleans Era contains the following communication from a correspondent in Mexico:

MONTREY, June 8, 1864.

"Some ten days ago Gen. Doblado tried to make a push against the imperial party at a town called Matuhuala, some eighty leagues from this place. His force numbered two thousand five hundred men, with ten pieces of artillery. He made a good push, but was unfortunate, losing everything. Several of his officers were taken prisoners and shot.

"Among them was an American by the name of Rodgers. The French, after ill-treating him, shot the poor fellow because he was an American. The French commander, Col. Lamar, said that the Yankees have no right to meddle in the Mexican question, therefore I suppose that only the French have this privilege. Poor, brave man, he stood like a hero and war shot down; several other officers suffered the same bloody penalty. Gen. Doblado arrived here safe on the 3d, and had a long private interview with Col. de Bordon, now Gen. de Bordon.

"The state of the Government is very bad. General Negrette is the only one who labors hard to keep things in order; all appears to be in disorder. General Quesada, who commands at Saltillo, shot on the 5th two officers, Colonel Bruno Losano and Major Ugartechea, both accused of mutiny. Every one here seems very blood-thirsty. I have just understood that General Doblado goes to the United States with General de Bordon, and that great things are expected from both these gentlemen. Juarez and his cabinet appear to be a dead thing.

"Secessionists are now gaining strength every day, although the Juarez Government does all it can to keep them under. Great things are expected from the American people if Richmond is taken. The Mexican people pray for the triumph of our arms, and we must help them against their invaders.

"General Gonzalez Ortega will be here in a few days with some 6,000 men, well armed. The French have lately made no demonstrations against this city, and are not likely to do so."
