The Russian Minister has officially communicated to the State Department a decree of his Government requiring all merchant vessels, as well masted or seagoing, as coasters and without masts, arriving at the port of Cronstadt, to pay to the benefit of the municipal revenues a special tax for their cleansing and for the removal of their filth.
