



I have been expecting a call from the Presicent of the United States, or a request from the Governor of the State now invaded by the rebels, for troops to aid in driving back the invaders. Not having received such call or re-quest, I assume that the authorities near the cene of action believe they have sufficient force at their command to meet the emergency. I, however, view the expedition as more serious than an ordinary raid. A battle has been fought within a few miles of Baltimore, and our forces (composed in part of veteran troops) have been driven back. Intelligence has been received that the railway between Philadelphia and Baltimore has been cut, and communication between the East and Wash-ington interrupted. The National Capital is seriously threatened.

Although New Jersey has not been officially called upon for troops in this emergency, yet regarding the danger as imminent, I call upon the citizens of this State to organize immediately into companies and report to the Ad-jutant General of the State for thirty days ervice in Pennsylvania, Maryland or the
