Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pranzylvania in General Assem-by met, That the following amedments be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the teath article thereof: There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

of the constitution, to be designated as section four, as ("SECTION 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military ser-vice, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the cltizens, under such regulations as arc, or shall be preseribed by law, as Tuly as if they were present at their usual place of election."

their usual place of election." SECTION 2. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as sections eight and nine, as follows: "SECTION 8. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be elearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills." "SECTION 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, whore the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been, or may hereafter be, confarged upon the courts of this Commonwealth."
