THIRTY THOUSAND MEN are wanted immediately for State defense. They are to be mustered into the State service, and serve during the emergency. The Governor's proclamation and accompanying order will be found in our columns to-day. All able-bodied men who can possibly leave their business for a brief period should rally at once to defend the State from the rebel hordes who are about to invade us for the purpose of destroying our towns and cities, and robbing our people.

ANOTHER batch of colored people arrived here, from Cumberland Valley, yesterday. They do not doubt, saddled on account of the rumor that the rebels were coming. These poor creatures are indeed to be pitied. They are compelled to leave their homes upon every approach of the rebels, through fear of being captured. Many of them are penniless—all are poor, and by their constantly moving to and fro are unable to earn anything towards maintaining themselves during the coming winter.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOOTING—Soldier Killed.—A case of accidental shooting occurred at Baltimore yesterday, by which a soldier lost his life. The company of stragglers, and the Minute Men accompanying them, from this city, were delayed several hours in Baltimore. A guard was placed over the stragglers, to prevent their escape, and while one of the Minute Men was in charge of his duty, his gun was accidentally discharged, the bullet entering the head of one of the men under guard, and killing him instantly. An investigation of the case was had at once, and the young man who committed the deed was honorably discharged.

MURDER.—A brutal murder was committed in the quiet and beautiful village of Turckhannock, in this State, one week ago last Thursday. The particulars are as follows: Two young men, named Jerry Dunn and Tom King, formerly of Oswego, N. Y., brought a negro there for the purpose of enlisting him as a substitute, but the negro becoming dissatisfied, told them that he would not enlist, and started to leave their company. They followed him to a house, but he kept on walking faster and faster, until he passed a house, when a dog came out and bit him. This made the negro increase his speed to a run, when the two young men fired their revolvers at him. Still the negro kept running, when after about dozen shots had been fired at him, seven of which took effect, he threw both arms up, and implored them to desist, and give him time to pray. They came to him and said, "We will give you time to pray, you," and one picked up a club and the other a large stone, and beat his brains out, literally grinding his head to powder. They were immediately arrested and placed in the Turckhannock jail, where they now are awaiting their trial and conviction for murder.

FIENDISHNESS OF THE REBELS AT CHAMBERSBURG.—The Pittsburgh Commercial has an account of the burning of Chambersburg. From two ladies who were witnesses of the whole affair. It says:

"One instance related to us seems so repugnant to all our ideas of human nature that we do not deem it proper to publish the veracity of our informants, we should hesitate to credit it even if the rebels. It seems that one house to which they set fire contained the corpse of a dead woman. This fact was made known to the incendiaries, and in the name of our common humanity they were entreated to spare the building. They refused, and after rudely removing the corpse to a lot near by, applied the torch and the house of the dead was a smoldering ruin."

Another case was related to us of a young lady lying dangerously ill in her room, and upon the bed being made known, it was not until a guard of the rebels had entered the sick chamber and by a personal examination satisfied themselves of the dying girl's condition that they consented to forego burning the house.

These notes will be convertible at the option of the holder at maturity, into six per cent. gold-bearing bonds, redeemable after five and payable twenty years from August 15, 1867.

The Notes will be issued in denominations of fifty, one hundred, five hundred, one thousand, and five thousand dollars, and will be issued in blank, or payable to order, as may be directed by the subscribers.
