BITTEN BY A SNAKE.—Wm. Bott, aged eight years, of Hanover, was bitten by a snake on which he set his foot when crossing a field, on Thursday last. Swelling commenced immediately, and reached the heart within six hours, when the boy immediately expired.

A CHANGE.—The Western Christian Advocate, published at Cincinnati, says the Rev. Wm. A. Snively, late pastor of the Union Methodist Episcopal Church, at Carlisle, Pa., has united with the Protestant Episcopal Church.

We have again been favored with rain. Several showers have fallen within the past twenty-four hours. At four o'clock this morning it seemed as though the rain was being poured from the clouds. These showers are just in season, and will do an immense amount of good. Let them continue.

AT HOME.—Capt. Ross' company of one hundred day men arrived here, unexpectedly, yesterday. They were detailed to escort several hundred rebel prisoners this far on their way to Elmira, and remained at home till noon to-day. They are in the enjoyment of health, and appear to be pleased with soldier's life. The boys returned to camp, near Baltimore, this afternoon.

BARN BURN.—We regret to learn that the barn of Mr. Mayer, member from Lancaster county, was totally destroyed on Sunday morning last. The barn contained his whole grain crop, five horses and many articles of value. The loss is estimated at from seven to eight thousand dollars, with only a partial insurance on the barn and contents, of some two thousand dollars. The fire is said to have been the work of an incendiary.

EXTORTION.—The somewhat slim attendance of our country cousins at market, this morning, caused those who were present to advance prices to a high pitch. Butter, which commanded but 25 to 35 cents last Saturday, went up to 50 this morning. A large majority of the country folks who attend market take advantage of every opportunity to extort money from the pockets of our citizens. The single item of marketing above mentioned, was worth no more this morning than last week, yet the price was nearly doubled. Our citizens should take some action to protect themselves against the daylight extortion practiced by those who sell produce in our markets.

PEACHES.—We alluded recently to the high price which peaches are bringing here as compared with what they sold for elsewhere. The Philadelphia Ledger of Saturday says: "The markets were so overstocked with peaches during the past week that they were sold at very low prices, ranging at one time as low as twenty-five cents the basket." On Saturday at the Delaware Avenue Market, many thousands of baskets were sold from New Jersey and Delaware orchards. The present week will be another week of plenty, as large quantities of the fruit remain ungathered in neighboring orchards, and it is so perishable that it has to be sold off as soon as taken from the trees. With peaches selling at twenty-five cents a basket in Philadelphia, it requires but very little calculation to show that they ought not to command \$2 50 and \$3 50, the price demanded for them here.

DETENTION FOR TRAIN.—The Cumberland Valley train due here at 11:30 to-day, did not arrive until near one o'clock. The detention was owing to the locomotive giving out near Shippensburg.

DIED FROM HIS WOUNDS.—Lieut. L. R. Witman, Adjutant of the 46th Penna. regiment, who was wounded in the foot, at Atlanta, on the 23d of July, and was subjected to amputation, died on the 6th inst., at the hospital at Chattanooga, and was buried there. Deceased belonged to the upper end of Dauphin county, and was a brave soldier.

"FAMILY JARS."—John Baulus and Barbara, his wife, were before the Mayor to-day, on a charge of assaulting and battering each other. It appears that Baulus was home "fuddled," last night, and abused his wife, who had already retired. She, in self-defense, seized a coal-oil lamp and struck her lord on the arm, severing an artery. To-day both were bound over to answer at court.

HOPE FIRE COMPANY.—A stated meeting of the Hope Fire Company will be held on Friday evening, (19th inst.,) at their Hall. PROFESSOR ELECTED.—At a meeting of the Directors of the Theological Seminary in Gettysburg, last week, the Rev. James A. Brown, D. D., of York, was unanimously elected Professor of Didactic Theology, in the room of Rev. Dr. Schmucker, resigned, who has filled the position with marked ability for the last forty years. Dr. Brown is a man of high character as a learned and able theologian.
