ENDOWMENT OF PENNSYLVANIA COLLEGE.—An earnest effort is about being inaugurated by some of the friends of Pennsylvania College, (located at Gettysburg,) to secure the endowment of that popular institution, in order that its means of doing good may be enlarged and the cause of education enhanced.

In order to place the matter fully before the friends of the college, in general, it has been determined to hold a convention in Harrisburg, on Tuesday, the 18th day of October next, to adopt such measures as shall speedily secure the desired object. Committees have been appointed in behalf of the trustees, and of the Alumni Association of the College, to solicit the attendance and co-operation of those who will be likely to take an interest in the matter. Rev. Dr. Hay, of this city, is chairman of the first-named committee, to whom persons who desire to attend the convention should communicate the fact, and entertainment will be secured for them.

Pennsylvania College is a time-honored institution, whose representatives are scattered all over the land, and its endowment would be of great advantage to the cause for which it was founded. It is hoped that there will be a general attendance at the convention to be held here.

ANOTHER ACCIDENT ON THE N. C. R. R.—A

soldier belonging to one of the returning Ohio regiments, was struck by a bridge, near Summit, on the Northern Central railroad, this morning, and fatally injured. He was on top of one of the cars, and as the train passed through the bridge his head came in contact with the timbers. He was brought to this city, and placed in the Sick Soldiers' Rest. No hopes are entertained of his recovery.

SOLDIER KILLED.—Last night a soldier was killed by a train of cars, in the vicinity of the Round House, on the Pennsylvania railroad. One of his feet was severed from the ankle, and the other foot and leg were terribly crushed. His body was also considerably injured. We have been unable to learn the name of this unfortunate soldier. He has probably left a family, who may never learn the fate of the brave man, unless there were papers in his possession by which he can be identified.

The patients are attended by ladies—those ministering angels—whose attentions are calculated to alleviate the sufferings of the sick. No doubt the Rest will be remembered by those brave men long after they return to the field of strife. It is well enough to repeat here what we have already recorded in these columns, that our good friend, Eby, Byers, Esq., overlooks the sources necessary to the maintenance of the Rest with a vigilance which constantly keeps them flowing in abundance.

THE EXEMPTS.—A Mis understanding.—For several weeks past the different Provost Marshals have notified those who claim to be exempt from enrollment, to come forward and have their names stricken from the list before the draft takes place. This notice has been very generally misinterpreted. In several instances parties who have claimed exemption on the ground of heart disease, &c., have applied to be relieved and have been somewhat disappointed when informed that it would be time enough to present themselves when drafted. The truth is that the Provost Marshals desire to relieve their lists of the names of those who are manifestly incapable of rendering service. If a man with one leg or one arm, or blind or suffering from some apparent physical disability, presents himself before the Board his name would be at once stricken off. If he is manifestly over or under the age prescribed by the law, the same course will be pursued. In this way it is hoped that when the drawing does take place, the exemptions of account of disability will not prove so numerous as in the former draft.
