It appears he had a threshing and cleaning machine in operation at the time, and was engaged in measuring up the grain as it came from the machine, when some part of his clothing being caught by the tumbling shaft, which revolves at a very rapid rate, he was sussoured. whirled around at a frightful speed and killed almost instantly.
