The other two, believing that their companion had been killed, confessed that they were rebel spies, and belonged to Gilmore's com-mand. They were taken to Carlisle, handed over to the military authorities, and placed in confinement, to await trial. In the meantime, several citizens of Newville went in pursuit of the Johnny who had jumped from the train. He was found in a field adjacent to the "jumping off place," and when ap-proached he drew a revolver, and threatened to shoot any person who would advance. Fi nally the pursuers closed in upon him, and he was captured. He was severely injured by his fall from the train. This rebel was also taken to Carlisle, and on the route ac knowledged that he, too, was a spy. The authorities have him in charge, and the whole party will be tried together. They now deny that they were spies, or that they made any confession to those who arrested them, but claim that they are deserters. The latter story is improbable, as they passed by the military posts at Martinsburg, Hagerstown and Cham-bersburg, without attempting to give them-

Had these spies not been captured, they would have visited Harrisburg, and might have accomplished a great amount of evil. The Chambersburg papers state that Franklin county is infested with spies, and they are scattered over the State.
