A GOOD SUBSTITUTE FOR BUCKWHEAT CARES. To three pints of warm water add a dessert spoonful of salt, three table spoonfuls of good yeast, and stir in middlings (course flour) to the consistency of a thick batter: let it stand over night, and if a little sour in the morning. add a little soda dissolved in warm water, and make as you would any other pan-cakes. They are a nice, healthy dish for breakfast, and not so injurious as buckwheat. Give them a trial and be convinced of it.

Condensed Apple Juce,—The juice of apples, or sweet cider, before it has undergone any termentation, may be boiled down to one seventh of its original bulk, without losing its flavor or any good quality. It has no taste of boiled cider, but is a beautiful amber colored jelly, pleasant to eat in its simple state, particularly as a tart sauce, with poultry, game, or other meets. It makes excellent pies and tarts, and may, in fact, he applied to all those uses to which dried apples or its bulk of water(the quantity originally with-drawn) we may have sweet cider again, which will undergo fermentation, as it would have done at first, but more slowly, and, like other cider, go through all the changes, until it ultimately becomes hard gider.

AGRICULMURAL STATISTICS.—From the census returns for 1860, which have just been printed, it appears that the State of Illinois produced the largest quantity of wheat and Indian corn of any State in the Union, viz: 23,837,023 bushels of wheat, and 115,174,777 bushels of Indian corn.

Pennsylvania produced the most rye and buckwheat; 5,474,788 bushels of the former

and 5,572.024 of the latter. New York produced the most oats, potatoes,

hay, butter and cheese.
Chio produced the most wool and wine;
10,608,926 pounds of the former and 568,617

gallons of the latter.

Yirginia produced the most tobacco, and
Kentucky the next largest quantity; the former 123,968,312 pounds, and the latter State

108,126,840 pounds.
Mississippi produced the largest amount of cotton, and Alabama the next largest quantity; the former 1,202,507 bales of 400 pounds each and the latter 989,955 bales.

South Carolina produced the most rice, and Georgia the next largest quantity; the former 119,100,528 pounds, and the latter 52,507,652

Louisiana produced the most sugar; 221,-726 hogsheads of the former, and 13,439,772 gallons of the latter.
